

## Roos chase that

IT'S been six months and 14 days since that cold, windy day last September – a day etched in the memory of the Balranald faithful who witnessed history being made.

Even with their side down by 11 goals during the second quarter of the A Grade netball grand final, those in blue and white – and there were plenty of them – still believed.

And not even the howling wind or showers of rain could dampen the spirits of their team, who turned the game on its head, and came back to record the club's first A Grade premiership.

"It was unlike anything I've ever experienced before – seeing people who have dedicated their entire lives to the club with tears in their eyes is something I'll treasure forever," coach Jess Parry recalled.

"People like Bronwyn Brougham, Lisa Jolliffe, Dee Jess, Lita Anderson, ladies who have been there a long time and put in an enormous amount of work, especially when things weren't going so well – to see the emotion on their faces was something pretty special.

"It wasn't just about those of us that were on court that day, but it was for the generations of women before us and the work that they'd put into the club – to see that hard work come to fruition, that was the real reward."

While Balranald went into the grand final against Swan Hill as underdogs, they were very much the popular pick among the neutral supporters. They had survived an arduous

finals campaign, that involved an extra time win over Lake Boga and a table-turning seven-goal victory over the Mallee Eagles in the preliminary final before overcoming the Swans in the big one.

One of those who had dedicated a large chunk of their life to the cause was Bronwyn Brougham, who was not only invested through her tireless work around the club, but also through her daughter Elli-Jane, who is now Balranald's only premiership winning goal keeper.

"I'm still speechless to be honest – some days, even now, I don't think it's sunk in that it actually happened," Brougham said.

"It was a very emotional ride, but on the day I think everyone thought all the decades of hard work and patience, it was all worth it for that moment alone.

"During the game, when we were 11 goals down, I think everyone thought it was over – at that point we just hoped they would come back and not let the game blow out."

Not only did Balranald not let the game blow out, but they fought their way back to trail by six at the main break. And while most expected Swan Hill to respond, Parry knew better.

"I remember when I first moved up to Balranald and saw so many of the local girls still involved in the club and just trying their hearts out even though the results hadn't been going their way," she said.

"Watching them train, I thought to myself that these girls could play, but they just needed a bit more belief that they were good enough – and then to see so many local girls on that court and a part of that history-making

# winning feeling

win, that's what made it so special for me.

"It was pretty emotional – I know as a coach you always dream of winning a flag, and coming up to Balranald I thought how good would it be if we could win one, while not realising that they hadn't ever won one."

The scenes following the win from the Balranald fans who travelled south was not unlike the halcyon days of the late 2000s, when Balranald were on top of the football tree.

It was a proud sight for Brougham, who still gets emotional thinking about that day and what it meant to her tight-knit community.

"Looking back at some of the photos that were taken that day and it was just a sea of blue and white – there were just Balranald people everywhere," Brougham said.

"It was honestly just a dream come true

for the whole town.

"The entire Balranald community got behind them – not just the footy and netball club, the whole community.

"As you drove over the bridge at Balranald there were signs and streamers everywhere, and then when you got to the bridge at Murray Downs, again it was just a sea of blue and white – driving there that day you could feel the love and the energy, it was just incredible."

For the group of girls who achieved greatness, they now share an unbreakable hond

And even though it wasn't Parry's first medallion (she has won five others with her home club Navarre) that special bond with her Balranald teammates is now invaluable.

"We all get along so well off the court,

we're all similar personalities – that's what makes it so special," Parry said.

"Winning a grand final and having that celebration, it just creates a bond between your group that can't be broken.

"Now we've got reunions to look forward to, we've got an excuse to be together and celebrate something remarkable that we were all able to achieve."

But as joyous an occasion as last year was, that was then and this is now.

Balranald's A Grade team knows they are no longer the hunters, but are instead the hunted.

But Parry is confident that her team is up to the task.

"We're in unfamiliar territory, which is exciting for us too, but we've prepared as well as we can and I think we'll give it a really good shot again," Parry said.

"We've had a couple of girls move on from our senior squad and a couple that have suffered injuries that will keep them out of playing this season, but our numbers are looking good and I'm confident we'll still be very competitive.

"With that said, we're realistic too – we know how long we had to wait and how much hard work and dedication it took to get us to where we did last year and everyone else is going to be wanting that same result too.

"We're well aware that there's a lot of hard work to do before we can even think about getting back there again – but we'll approach this season in the same way we have previously, that being our first aim is to just make the finals and then we'll build on it from there."

# Giant year ahead

WHEN Nyah-Nyah West United host Balranald in round 10 this year, there will be two young men keeping a close eye on proceedings, albeit from some 800km away.

Bragging rights will be on the line between Brent Daniels and Jason Gillbee, the two young Central Murray stars who were linked as AFL teammates at the GWS Giants after Gillbee was picked up as a category B rookie selection in last year's draft.

While it will be Gillbee's first year in the AFL system, 2023 also shapes as a defining one in the career of Daniels, who is hoping to cement a regular senior spot after battling persistent hamstring injuries last season.

The early signs are promising for one of the shortest players in the AFL, with Daniels not only being selected to play in round 1, but impressing with two goals in the Giants' 16-point win over Adelaide.

Daniels said the past 18 months had been a challenge, but also an experience that taught him some valuable lessons along the way.

"Last year was really tough injury-wise, plus had a few hamstring issues in 2021 as well," Daniels said.

"What probably made it tougher was that the club weren't going too well on the field either, so to not be able to contribute made it even worse.

"But at the same time it's not the end of the world – yeah it sucks to be injured, but there's definitely worse things going on in life and I suppose that's the perspective that you have to keep at times when things aren't going your way.

"You have to keep that balance – I've got great family and great friends up here and they all keep me in check and moving in the right direction."

One of those mates is Gillbee, who despite only being on the Giants list for only four months, has certainly made an impression.

While the 18 year-old Balranald product is set to pay his dues in the reserves, he is willing to bide his time and continue working on his game – just as Daniels did in his debut season.

"At this point it's just about getting some more experience against bigger bodies and getting used to the contact and speed of professional football," Gillbee said.

"A lot of people probably think you have to dominate in the reserves to get a game in the seniors, but it's so not like that – you just have

to lock down your role and play that perfectly and then the opportunities will come.

"Hopefully at some stage this season I've done enough to get a game (in the AFL), but for now I'm happy just playing in the reserves and earning my stripes."

Both Daniels and Gillbee are prime examples of where hard work and dedication can get you.

Both moved away from home to pursue their footballing dreams while still at high school and both were made to earn their spot on an AFL list. Daniels, widely labelled as being too small to play, proved that size is no substitute for heart – while the naturally skilled Gillbee was forced to sit through both the national and rookie drafts before finally being selected by GWS post-draft.

So, for two country boys living their dreams in the nation's biggest city, the question is, what does the life of an AFL footballer look like?

"I always say you miss out on a lot – especially when I was younger," Daniels said.

"My mates' 21sts, family birthdays, you just don't get to go to them and I guess people don't understand that you really do have to sacrifice a fair bit.

"It's a life that looks great from the outside and it's an awesome job, don't get me wrong, I love doing it, but you do have to sacrifice a lot at the same time."

It's a similar sentiment for Gillbee, and although both he and Daniels wouldn't change it for the world, it still taken takes adjustment.

"Do I miss the farm? Yeah, sometimes – but I definitely wouldn't call myself homesick," Gillbee said

"It's more just missing doing some things that you've done your whole life and not being able to do those things you enjoy on your days off

"Sometimes when you're sitting around not doing much, I'll think 'gee, it'd be nice to be back on the farm helping dad right now,' but I'm certainly not missing it in the way that I'm homesick – far from it."

In fact, Gillbee has seemingly settled into city life like a duck to water, along with his house mate and good friend – No.1 draft pick Aaron Cadman.

"I think it's awesome being up here, to be honest." Gillbee said.

"'Caddy' (Cadman) and I talk about it a fair bit – for someone like him, with the profile he has, you can walk around town and nobody



really knows who you are, even people like Toby Greene don't even get pestered that much and he's about as big a name as there is in the AFL.

"He's (Cadman) a great housemate, he's pretty neat and tidy and likes everything perfect, so he's always onto me and Max (Gruzewski)

"I'm not saying I'm messy by the way, just maybe not as tidy as he is – and he does tend to keep us in line a little bit more because he's a big boy and you don't want to him to get angry.

"We're certainly going through a fair bit of food at the moment because of him, that's for sure."

In fact, it was Gillbee's diet – or in particular, his penchant for milk – captured national media

For the man now affectionately known as "the Milkman", it was an early look into life in the limelight, with a throwaway comment in a team

meeting picked up by a journalist in the room and circulated nationwide. But for Gillbee, it was all a storm in a tea cup - one with plenty of milk in it no doubt.

"It was crazy honestly - I was doing a bit of work with the media team and they couldn't even help me that much because it was such a random thing to happen," Gillbee said.

"We were away on camp and I saw a couple of messages but didn't have much service, so I

didn't really know about it until I got my phone back, but for two or three weeks it just went

"It was a bit of an eye opener to the world of media, but I enjoyed it, and just went along with it.

"All I said in the meeting with the boys was that I drink a lot of milk instead of water because I just prefer the taste and everyone had a bit of a laugh - it all started from there

"I'll definitely be tuning in when they play each other and I'll be watching Balranald pretty closely all season, because I think they'll have a pretty successful year by the looks of it."

# Commentators make their big calls WITH the 2023 football season just weeks, who better to take an in depth look at who's in, who's out, and who's the team to challenge Kerang, than the 3SH Central Murray Live commentary team. The results might even surprise you.

Shane Fleming (SF): OK, before we get started, I think we should probably welcome the new guys who are joining our call team full-time this year – Matt and Choco, welcome

Matt Curran (MC): Thanks Flemo.

David Alderuccio (DA): Cheers mate.

SF: Righto, the new season is upon us finally. The big question is, can anybody outside of the big three (Kerang, Cohuna, Woorinen) actually win it?

DA: Yeah, I think Balranald can challenge them

MC: Balranald definitely can.

Glenn Stewart (GS) - I think Balranald and

Lake Boga are a chance to push up definitely. Woorinen have got (Doug) Beames coming back, "Warby" (Lachlan Warburton) is coming back too

Noel Watson (NW): The only one outside of that top three for mine is Balranald and only if they can hold it together, because I think their biggest problem will be their depth.

**SF:** Having spoken to Jydon Neagle over the pre-season, he said they've picked up a few very handy players and have only lost one.

NW: That was the only question I had on them.

MC: It's usually your bottom six players that win you the flag, not your top six, because the best players in most sides are all pretty even, let's be honest.

**GS:** Kobe (Lloyd) comes back in for them too and then they have both Drew (Lloyd) and Ben Fuller down forward as well. We know how important Fuller is to their team, so they need to keep him fit because if he's not there, they will really struggle to score against the better sides

SF: We saw what happened to Balranald last year when Fuller hurt his hamstring in the warm-up of their round 1 game against Tyntynder and they didn't win a game for the first month because he wasn't there. You can't underestimate how important a key forward like him is to a side.

**GS:** Their back half is pretty solid too, then you've got the Neagles in the midfield.

NW: Cohuna have a bit of a question mark over them for me, because they've lost (Ben) Archard and they've lost (Tom) Toma as well. I know he's only one player, but he was clearly their best player – and the big fella in the ruck, he was a really dominant ruckman for them.

GS: Didn't Cohuna pick up a ruckman though?

**SF:** Yeah, they've recruited Jake Hammond's brother Nathan, but he's more of a key defender and a back-up ruckman I believe.

**GS:** Yeah OK. I think Archard will be hard to replace, when you lose a ruckman like him, it's tough.

**SF:** What about Woorinen, surely they'll be thereabouts again?

GS: Yeah, I don't know, I've got them sliding.

NW: Really?

**GS:** It's not because they aren't a good team still, I just think a few others will go past them. Balranald will clearly improve, I think Boga get better and I think the Saints might be a bit of a smoky as well.

**DA:** What are these recruits like at Boga, Stewy?

**GS:** Pretty good apparently. From all reports, they've lost as many as they've gained, but the ones they've picked up are better than the ones they've lost. They had the best ruckman in the competition last year in (Jacob) Simpson. He was that good he should have won the Jack Betts last year in my opinion.

DA: I think the couple of key forwards that they have picked up will be the biggest assets for them.

**MC:** If (Angus) Monfries is their No.3 forward, then that's a pretty strong forward line.

NW: It'll straighten them up though too, which will put a lot of pressure on a lot of sides, because a lot of teams don't have those big key defenders anymore. The sides they're going to smash, like Koondrook-Barham, Swan Hill, maybe the Mallee Eagles, that's because they're just going to be too big up forward and those teams just won't have the cattle down back to compete.

DA: Tooley-Manang?

NW: I don't know about them. It will be interesting to watch how Tooleybuc-Manangatang are going to go. They have brought in a lot of players.

SF: Having spoken with Dean (Helmers) a few weeks ago, the sentiment was that he's expecting them to play finals. Every guy they've picked up either has VFL experience or the equivalent standard, so they'll improve, no worries.

**GS:** Well, let's do a cross examination. Woorinen or Cohuna Kangas, because I think Kerang are there.

**SF:** So you've got Kerang over the line, have you Stewy?

**GS:** Kerang will finish on top. Something would need to go wrong for them to not finish on top. OK, they've lost (Bryce) Curnow, who was an exceptionally good player.

NW: On Curnow, he went forward when they needed him too, he went back when they needed someone to stop the bleeding. I'm not saying they won't be thereabouts at the finish, but don't worry, they'll really miss him.

**GS:** Cohuna would have won the grand final if it wasn't for Curnow.

SF: Will Kerang improve though?

**GS:** Their best is still very good – and I think their best is the best.

NW: What about Tyntynder? They're a side that are all about our size, they're the side that might slide for me.

MC: Haven't they lost Marcus Wattie?

SF: They have.

MC: Wasn't he one of their key midfielders last year? You don't replace them too easily, do you.

DA: Tom Sala has gone too, I think.

NW: I reckon, for me, if you're looking at the teams that will slide, Tyntynder is probably the one. Because a couple of the others, like Swan Hill, are already down there.

SF: Where are Swan Hill at Noel?

NW: Absolute rebuild. The coach (Cal Beasy) they've got is a good bloke to have in charge. He's coached some of these kids on the way through, he knows what each of them are capable of doing and what they aren't, so he's the right coach for them to have for the moment. I don't know if he's their next premiership coach, but he's the right coach for the moment.

SF: They've picked up a couple though.

NW: Yeah, but a lot of their depth has gone straight out to Ultima.

MC: They're going to be a very young side.

NW: Absolutely they will be, with Matt Wade and Xavier Moloney holding them together. But again, who are their big guys? Lake Boga's picked up a couple, but Swan Hill haven't. Anyway, where do United sit Matt?

**MC:** Good question. They've picked up a lot of names, so it'll be interesting to see them get on the park and see how they all gel together.

NW: It will be interesting all right. I think with a lot of teams, we're not really going to know where they sit until after the first five rounds.

**MC:** These early games are really going to be eight-point games. Bank early wins, because it's amazing how often you need them later on in the year.

NW: Who's the best recruit coming into the league Shane?

SF: Well, from what I've heard, the two Neagle boys, especially Matthew. Apparently, he's every bit as good as his brother Jydon, if not better, and he won the medal last year so that's good enough for me.

NW: They're definitely in my top five.

MC: They play half their games at Balranald

too, so that will help as well.

SF: The only team we haven't spoken about Choco is the Mallee Eagles. I don't think anyone knows what's happening out there do they?

**DA:** Not really no. I've heard they've picked up a couple of good Melbourne players, but that's about it.

SF: They've lost a heap though.

**DA:** Yeah including their full-forward (Sam) Dunstan, who kicked most of their goals last year.

**SF:** Tom McGregor is an equally big loss for mine too

**GS**: I really rated him highly, Tom. Not only that, he's a local and a one-point player too.

NW: It's hard to see them playing finals. Surely not.

DA: They did have a lot of injuries though.

**GS:** Can Koondrook-Barham bounce back with their new coach?

**SF:** I think they'll definitely improve, but they are coming from a really long way back.

GS: So are Tooley-Manang.

SF: Yeah, but again, the players they've picked up have pretty good CVs. I'm not too sure the Raiders recruits are at the same level. Plus, they've also lost a few more players than the Saints too.

**NW:** Whatever happens, it's going to be a bloody interesting year.

AFTER narrowly missing out on the finals last season, the Roo boys are building towards something special in 2023 – and it's on the back of a very familiar name.

The Neagle name has long been synonymous with Balranald – as it will this year, with reigning Jack Betts Medalist Jydon Neagle taking the reins as the Roos' sole coach this season. Now his brothers Matthew and Jaxon are joining him at Balranald to aim ro completely turn around their home town's fortunes and qualify for their first finals series since 2010.

While the Neagle brothers will be the main act this season at Greenham Park, they won't be the only cause for celebration, with the return of Kobe Lloyd and the recruitment of former SANFL midfielder Ethan Gant to the club set to have just as big an impact.

With Connor Soraggi the only regular senior player departure from last season, there's no doubt Balranald are really well placed to break their 13-year finals drought this season – with Neagle pointing to his team's beefed up midfield as to where he feels most games will be won by his team in 2023.

"We'll be a lot stronger through the midfield than we were last year – we'll have Matthew (Neagle), Ethan (Gant) and Kobe (Lloyd) as being close to our starting midfield, which is basically a brand new midfield right there," Neagle said.

"We still have the likes of Tom Salau, Colin Andrews, Ryan Middlebrook, Drew Lloyd and Harrison Soraggi, all these guys that played that role for us last season and did a really good job running through there as well with our rotations.

"I feel our depth through the middle will be a real advantage for us and will be one that we'll hopefully be able to exploit.

"One of the biggest killers in country footy is the retention of players – but we've been able to retain pretty much all of our list from last season with the exception of Connor (Soraggi).

"To keep everyone else and gain four or five new players – and all of them A graders too – is definitely exciting for the club."

With a whole new starting midfield at their disposal, the Roos will also have a lot more quality both in defence and attack – with the likes of Drew Lloyd and Colin Andrews

spending more time forward, and Jydon Neagle pushing back to half back, where his run and accurate disposal can be properly utilized.

The one area where Balranald look thin

is in their key defensive posts. The third
Neagle brother – Jaxon – will hold down
center-half-back, which will leave Josh
Hodgson, Jarryd Stead and Daniel Bland to
play as lock down defenders.
While that may be a slight concern, the

best way to alleviate that problem according to Neagle is to maintain possession of the ball yourself – something the Roo's have been diligently working on over a long preseason.

"I think we'll play in a similar way to last year, but our efficiency with the ball is something we've worked on a lot," Neagle said.

"It's not overly complicated stuff, just simple things like a missed handball or a missed kick which should be hit, especially at senior level, and just gives the ball back to the opposition unnecessarily.

"If we can tidy that stuff up and clean up fifty per cent of our turnovers from last year, then hopefully we can convert that into scores and hit the scoreboard.

"The best teams very rarely give it back to you when they have the ball, so we really don't want to be giving it back to them when it's our turn with it either."

#### FROM THE COACH

"We think we were a bit stiff to miss out on finals last year, we let a couple of games slip that we shouldn't have. I'd like to think we'll be pretty competitive and with the team we've assembled win those games we're meant to and finish in the top five."

With the squad they've assembled this season, anything less than a finals appearance for Balranald and they've underachieved. The Roos finished just one win away from a top five spot in 2022 and if it wasn't for their slow start to the season, they arguably would have made it. The one difference this year will be their fixture, which will be a lot tougher this time around. Double up games against four of last year's finalists (Kerang, Woorinen, Lake Boga and Tyntynder) will be a challenge, but not insurmountable. The biggest challenge will be keeping their best side on the park and injury-free.

#### **KEY PLAYER**

Ben Fuller: While Jydon Neagle is hard to go past as the Roos' best player, he's not their most important. That honour belongs to key forward Ben Fuller, who at times played a lone hand in attack, booting 69 goals in 2022. It's no coincidence that Balranald lost their first three games last season while Fuller recovered from a hamstring strain – yet won 8 of their next 13 upon his return. Balranald must keep the big man fully fit and on the park.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Seth Connell: Started forward last year, but finished as one of the Roos on-ball rotations such was his improvement. Has a good leap, is a good mark and after putting in a big pre-season and improving his endurance, is expected to get another spot as part of Balranald's midfield rotations from the start.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

Will the return of the Neagle brothers signal a new era of dominance at Balranald?

Seventeen years after their father Merv led the Roos to the 2006 premiership, the Neagle brothers will be out to create their own slice of history. Having already witnessed the capabilities of Jydon last season, the Balranald faithful should be salivating at the prospect of two more quality footballers joining their ranks – and the potential upturn in competitiveness they will bring. While the Roos may still find themselves behind competition yardsticks Cohuna, Kerang and Woorinen, they are definitely building towards something special. Where it takes them, is anyone's guess.

WITH a new coach and fresh ideas, the Cohuna Kangas will be hoping to go one step further in 2023 – and finally break their premiership hoodoo in the Central Murray.

While widely regarded by many as the one that got away, the Kangas' heartbreaking 10-point loss in last year's grand final could well be the catalyst for success this season, according to new coach Tyson Findlay – who has taken over the reins from long time senior coach Neil Bradley.

"The club's never won a premiership as the Cohuna Kangas, so there's certainly a lot of motivation there for us," Findlay said.

"The playing group were pretty inexperienced in terms of grand final experience with regards to a lot of the locals, so I think last year will hold us in good stead for what it takes to win one.

"Kerang have been the bench mark for a long time and it was a good learning curve for our boys – we're champing at the bit to get another crack at it."

Cohuna have once again recruited strongly, adding both midfield experience and defensive depth to their squad, both areas that were identified as being weaknesses. The signings of Blackburn trio Pat Contin, Luke Conca and Anthony Fagan (all midfielders) and Nathan Hammond will give the Kangas immediate improvement, as will the return of wingman Will Thrum, whose run and carry will cause opposition teams plenty of headaches on the wide-open spaces of the Cohuna Rec. Reserve.

The news hasn't all been good, with Tom Toma, Ben Archard, Oscar Cooke and Josh Bird – all significant contributors last season – having departed the club.

"Losing Tom (Toma) will be a big loss, but he wants to have a crack playing a higher standard of footy again and we can't begrudge him for that," Findlay said.

"At the same time, it'll give a few of our younger guys a chance to play more through the midfield, which will be a positive for the development of guys like Jack Donat and Sam McGlone.

"They've both been champing at the bit to get in there, so it's going to be a good opportunity for them.

"We've lost some good young talent but added some experience, which I think we lacked a little bit last year in the big moments and I think that showed in the grand final when their (Kerang) leaders stepped up and took their games to another level."

While Cohuna will still possess one of the competition's most potent attacks – with league leading goal kicker Rhys Free and the dangerous Dylan Johnstone both returning – one of the changes their new coach wants to see is a more even spread of contributors hitting the scoreboard.

"We'll make a couple of adjustments to the way we play, especially forward of the footy just with not wanting to rely on the twin towers to do the bulk of the work," Findlay said. "Our game style will change a little bit, but it will be more how we set up in our forward half. We've got a good balance with the guys we've brought in and hopefully we can get a more even spread of contributors.

"We don't want to rely on the same guys to win the game each week – and that goes for the midfield, too.

"I think overall, we want to have plenty of versatility around the ground and not rely on the top tier guys to do the work – as well as implement a bit more handball receive and not just bomb the ball in to our big guys inside forward fifty all the time."

#### FROM THE COACH

"We think we can be around the mark again. Finishing top three is our goal and the disappointment of last year has really driven the group throughout the preseason. The competition sounds like it's evened out and most teams will be pretty competitive, but we definitely want to finish top three and then go from there."

BORN TO FARM



With the Kangas have retained the bulk of their playing list from last season, as well as adding more depth in defence and through the middle. They are well placed should they have a tough run with injuries. A new coach with a fresh outlook often sees clubs gain an early sugar hit, with Cohuna also set to adjust their game style - albeit slightly. The big unknown is does last year's grand final loss spur this list on to go one better - or does it serve as a constant reminder of the one that got away?

#### **KEY PLAYER**

Joel Helman: One of the best and most dynamic players in the league, Helman will be vital to the Kangas' chances of going one step further this season. The former Jack Betts Medallist can hurt opposition teams with both his ability to win the contested ball and his clean disposal on the outside. Will most likely get extra attention from opposition teams with the departure of Toma during the off-season, but will still be expected to break games open with bursts of brilliance – as he has in the past.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Jack Donat: Donat has played 57 senior games with Cohuna since his debut in 2017 and is perfectly placed to take his game to another level in 2023. The departure of Toma has opened up a midfield spot, with Donat set to be one of the major beneficiaries, after working diligently on his fitness base in the offseason. His ability to break the lines with his speed and desire to run and carry the ball will give the Kangas midfield a very different look about it this season.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

What changes will new coach Tyson Findlay have in store for Cohuna?

The Kangas will be under new leadership in 2023 after the retirement of Neil Bradley in the off-season. While Cohuna played a high possession, attacking brand of football under Bradley, you can expect more of a run and carry style game plan with Findlay at the helm. The Kangas liked to utilise the wideopen spaces of their home ground, and a more direct approach to moving the ball inside attacking 50 can be expected this season, among a raft of changes to the way Findlay wants his team to play.

AFTER being the benchmark club for the best part of a decade, Kerang will once again be the hunted when they start their premiership defence against Tooleybuc-Manangatang in round 1.

With Troy Coates continuing as coach and with the club retaining the bulk of their premiership list, the reigning premiers are expected to be the team to beat – despite the departure of their gun full-forward and joint coach Bryce Curnow.

While Curnow – along with Nick Stagg and Brandon Hayes – will be big losses, their absence shouldn't deter the Kerang faithful from dreaming of further success. A winning culture and a hunger to improve have long been part of the Blues brand – as has their ability to regenerate their list from within, with this year set to be no exception, according to their coach.

"Obviously, we've lost some quality players, but we've got some good players coming in too and you can never underestimate the development of kids," Coates said. "It's something our club still does well – we saw last year the development of guys like Sean Hunter and Tyson Clingan, as well as Rylee Smith, Josh Hunter, Rylee Gitsham and the Nitchske boys.

"Josh Nitschke's a great example of that, he turned himself from a back pocket player into being best on ground in the grand final and is one of the most underrated midfielders in the competition – his running ability is just next level for a guy that's six foot three."

Not only does Nitschke represent the future for the Blues, but following his breakout 2022 season, he now represents the present – with the on-field leader set to take on greater responsibilities in an ever-potent midfield. Joining him will be veterans Marty Kelly, Bradlee Pay, Ryan Gillingham and Sam Heavyside, with contributions from Clingan, Smith, Hayden Hall and Coates himself.

While Kerang's midfield will have a familiar look to it – their forward line is set to undergo a massive renovation, with the departure of Curnow forcing them to shuffle around the magnets.

"With 'Duck' (Curnow) going out, we might have a look at playing Michael Dalrymple forward and see if he can give us an option up there," Coates said.

"Our forward line was always going to

look a bit different and at this stage it might be a bit smaller and a bit quicker than last season.

"'Runci' (Michael Runciman) has put in a massive pre-season and we see him playing more of a hybrid forward role more so than a lead-up forward, along with Adam Hunter, Dalrymple and 'Langy' (Nick Lang) spending some time down there as well."

Kangaroo Flat ruckman Nick Lang's arrival will also force further adjustments to the Blues structure and will free up Troy Davis to move into back into defence alongside his brother Ashley, who returns to Kerang following a lengthy stint at Quambatook. But while the Blues may well look different on paper this season, the way they play the game won't.

"We'll go with a similar sort of game style again – we feel that was probably what won us the grand final in the end – with our running ability in the last quarter giving us a point of difference," Coates said.

"It worked last year and we don't see any reason why it wouldn't work again, particularly come finals time.

"It may hurt us a little bit throughout the season, not having those bigger bodies in the middle of the ground – but come the end of the year, having those guys that can cover the ground will hopefully prove to be a positive in our favour."

#### FROM THE COACH

"I think all coaches aim to finish in the top three, because you want to give yourself every opportunity with a double chance. That double chance really helped us last season with so many injuries and it just meant we didn't have to rush blokes and allowed us to get guys fit for the grand final."


#### **KEY PLAYER**

Michael Dalrymple: Perhaps the best key defender in the Central Murray, Dalrymple is set for a seachange in 2023, with the premiership Blue set to move into attack. Has spent time up forward in the past with some success and will most likely take the opposition's best defender each week, with his contested marking and ability to read the play considered elite in both categories. Has taken on the role of joint assistant coach this season and with his defensive capabilities well known, could become Kerang's ultimate swingman in the same vein as former full-forward Curnow.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

#### How big of a loss will Bryce Curnow be in 2023?

There's no doubt the hole left by the Blues premiership co-coach and 2021 Jack Betts Medallist is sizeable - both on and off the field. Not only will Kerang miss his forward craft and ability to read the play behind the ball, but they'll also miss his leadership off the field. Curnow has returned to Bendigo as joint coach of Sandhurst. Had a serious health scare mid-way through 2022 which saw him miss four matches, giving the Blues a look at life without their key forward - but there's no denying they were a better side with him than without.



Raiders have gone back to the drawing board in 2023 - with the return of a favourite son the first brick in the tri-colours rebuild.

With three senior coaches going through the doors in the past two seasons, Koondrook-Barham are confident they finally have their man, with Will Callow answering the SOS to help turn around the fortunes of his junior club. Callow returns with an impressive coaching resume, with three premierships as a coach of Irymple and Wandella to his name, among a long list of

After finishing 10th on the ladder and with iust two wins and one draw from sixteen games last season, Callow and his team go into the new season knowing the scale of the task at hand. But after a major list overhaul across the pre-season, and a lot of work on the track, the Raiders new coach is bullish about what the future holds for his young side.

'We'll have a pretty young list this year, so finding that consistent brand of footy will be paramount for us," Callow said.

'This season is all about stability and getting the kids back enjoying their football and being the best version of themselves. We've got a group a people, both committee and coaching staff, that are hellbent of having success - we're realistic and open minded as to how long it might take, but we have processes in place.

While Koondrook-Barham's off-field team has undergone significant change, so too has their playing list. Gone are the ludica brothers, Jordan and Lucas, Jaryd Wishart, Max Baldissera and talented youngsters Jake Dick-O'Flaherty and Jack Shannon - with the latter trying his luck with Geelong's VFL program.

Callow has brought reinforcements - and while the Raiders squad will have a significantly different look about it, the quality of the arrivals certainly appears to outweigh that of the departures at first glance. The Raiders have strengthened their midfield, which was one area of major concern last year, with former Wandella premiership player Cameron Moore set to join Dom Cirilo and former Williamstown VFL midfielder James Flack.

Also returning will be former locals Corey Barrington and Harley Burmeister to add depth around the ground, while perhaps the biggest inclusion could be assistant coach Bill Barry, whose versatility could see him deployed in the midfield, defence, or attack for his new club.

While their squad for the new season is now settled, Koondrook-Barham are still very much a work in progress, with their new coach keen for the season to start so he can assess exactly what he has to work with.

"I think we'll have a bit of an evolving game style - not least because we just don't know how the team will gel," Callow said.

'You can't think you can just turn up and play the way you want to play every week, because the reality is the opposition are trying to do the same thing and implement the way they like to play, too. I like to have a lot of versatility within the team in order to combat any curve balls that are thrown at us - but we'll be trying to find our own game plan as a unit, develop ourselves and put it on the group to be the best version of ourselves that we can be.'

#### FROM THE COACH

"We're under no illusions where we sit, but our aim this year is really about developing the kids and giving them the stability required to be successful. We've managed to put together a really talented playing list and I've got no doubt we'll be much more competitive and win our fair share of games along the way."

While there's definitely an air of excitement around Koondrook-Barham with the arrival of a new coach and a huge overhaul of their playing list – it's still very hard to see them playing finals this season. An extremely difficult start to the season is only set to compound their problems, with the Raiders fixtured to play all five finalists from 2022 in the opening seven rounds of the season, as well as NNW United and Balranald - the two of the teams who have recruited best of those outside last year's top five. While Kye Attwell and Clay Davis remain, losing Jack Shannon will really hurt the Raiders going forward. With this in mind, 2023 needs to be about improvement and giving the next generation of Koondrook-Barham footballers hope that brighter days are on the horizon.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Kye Attwell: The spring-heeled Attwell will be one to watch for the Raiders, with his contested marking ability a constant threat for opposition teams. If Koondrook-Barham are going to be successful this season, it needs to be their young key forward who sets the tone for the team and provides a strong target. Should have more opportunities to hit the scoreboard this season with a more consistent supply from the midfield and in turn give him a greater opportunity to have that breakout season he's been promising to have.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

Will the climb back up the ladder be a slow one – or will the Raiders bounce back quickly?

Following their last two disastrous campaigns, the focus for Koondrook-Barham needs to be on rebuilding their team from the ground up. There's no doubt that they now have the right man at the helm – but there can be no shortcuts, especially with depth within their senior squad likely to be an issue. Regardless, they should still be competitive and push most sides – but in terms of sustainability for the club going forward, youth development needs to be the main focus.

AFTER breaking a 12-year finals drought last season, the Lake Boga faithful will be hoping their club's rapid improvement continues in 2023.

The Magpies exceeded outside expectations last season by not only making the finals, but also winning one – defeating Tyntynder by 24 points in the elimination final.

With joint coaches Shawn Filo and Angus Monfries re-committing, the Magpies have also managed to secure a majority of last year's playing list.

For Monfries, that was his club's number one priority, with consistency of message bringing stability to the club. He now hopes to build on the momentum from the end of the 2022 season.

"We had a bit of a discussion at the end of last year around getting some good numbers on the track over the pre-season, building on the momentum that we had from last season and recruiting well – and that's exactly what we've been able to achieve so far," Monfries said.

"The development and the experience

"The development and the experience that a number of those local kids gained through playing finals last year was invaluable and will hold them in good stead – hopefully we can keep building on that and see that improvement continue.

"The reality is we know that the higher you get up the ladder, the harder it is to stay there – we just want to win as many games as we can and put ourselves in a position to go really deep into the season."

To help aid their improvement, Lake Boga has bolstered a couple of key areas of their playing list, with a distinct focus on both midfield depth and marking options inside their forward fifty.

Ricky Wild returns after a stint at Quambatook, winning the EG Hunt Medal last season, and he should slot seamlessly into one of the midfield rotations. Joining Wild will be Maroochydore's Jake Warren and another former Lake Boga junior in Marty Parsons, covering the loss of Matthew Filo and young gun Dustin Burns.

One of the Magpies' biggest deficiencies last season was their inability to convert forward entries into shots on goal, with a dearth of marking options inside their forward 50 more often than not the main culprit.

Monfries played a lone hand at times inside attacking 50 and was often double and triple teamed – but with a couple of new recruits arriving during the off-season, the former Essendon and Port Adelaide forward was hopeful his side's forward half woes would be left behind them.

"Dave (Gourdis) will be a great addition for us, along with Lochie (Laing) and both will help straighten us up," Monfries said. "I think the addition of those guys will

give us a few more avenues to goal which we really needed if we are to challenge the likes of Kerang and Cohuna.

"It probably won't change too much in terms of the way we move the footy, we like to move it quick and take it up the line and get it into one-on-one contests – but having the two big guys down there will be a big positive, because we were forced into hitting up the short target too often last year because of how undersized we were at times."

#### FROM THE COACH

"Every club wants to win the flag – and while we're realistic that there's some really good teams that we'll be coming up against, at the same time we don't want to put a limit on what we want to achieve. Stepping up from where we finished last season would definitely be expected, from our opinion."

Anything less than another finals appearance and 2023 would have to be considered a failure for the Magpies. They've improved their playing list from last year and the addition of tall forwards Gourdis and Laing will give them plenty of avenues to goal alongside Monfries and Jayden Lonergan. Their defence is sound and the way they structure up around the ground is solid, which will give them every chance to go deeper into September this year – providing they can keep their best 22 on the park more consistently.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Rory Colville: Has had an enormous pre-season by all accounts, including setting some impressive times during the time trials. Has improved his aerobic capacity out of sight and will likely be rewarded with first crack on the wing and more midfield minutes. Played 14 senior games last season including the Magpies' semi-final loss to Woorinen – and in his third year in the Magpies senior system, is ripe for a breakout season.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

#### Do Lake Boga have the midfield depth to compete with the big three?

While the Magpies would appear to have fixed their forward line woes on paper at least - the question now turns to whether they have the depth through the midfield to compete with the league's elite clubs on a weekly basis. The Lake Boga engine room will certainly have a different look and feel to it in 2023, with Matthew Filo and John Harvey departing - while also adding Ricky Wild, Jake Warren and Marty Parsons into the mix. They will join Nathaniel Holmes-Brown, Rory Colville and Tyle Williams, who was undoubtedly one of the most underrated players in the Central Murray last season – with contributions from Josh Cruse-Filo and Daniel Dzufer, with the Queensland pair set to each play just half a season plus finals in the black and white. AN exodus of players, combined with long-term injuries, will see the Mallee Eagles invest in their young local talent

Having spent the pre-COVID years fighting it out at the pointy end of the Central Murray ladder, the Eagles received a reality check last season - dropping out of the top five for the first time since 2016 amid an injury crisis.

But while a new season is about to dawn those same issues may be about to wreak havoc on yet another campaign. Both Jacob Wade and Wes Bennett will miss at least the first half of the season as they recover from ACL injuries, along with gun midfielder Toby Sheahan, who will also miss a large chunk of 2023 with injury.

Adding to their woes is their lengthy departures list, with Tom McGregor, Jake Foster, Luke Doolan and Sam Dunstan all finding new homes this season, while Jack Shannahan is another who won't be returning.

However, there is always a silver lining and, for the Mallee Eagles, it will be the increased opportunities afforded to their developing juniors.

Billy and Jacob O'Meara are expected to get their chance to impress, along with Harry McGregor, Jonah Devlin, Liam Drummond and Charlie Kingwill - and it's the prospect of the next generation of Lalbert footballers that has senior coach Brent Sheahan excited.

'There's five or six kids coming through that will push for senior selection - they're all super keen, have put in a big pre-season and the entire club is looking forward to seeing what they can produce," Sheahan said.

"Losing players, especially to injury, is never great, but at the same time it's provided us with a great opportunity to play

While the focus will clearly be on the upand-coming juniors, the Eagles have secured the services of a number of experienced heads from down south.

Joe Halloran's arrival at the nest is a timely one, with the former TAC Cup defender set to fill the vacancy left by McGregor at full-back. Also pulling on the blue and gold this season will be defender Brett Thomas, midfielder Matthew Despott and Thomson Football Club trio Paul Davis. Brent Macleod and Brandon Gardiner from the Geelong District league.

Even with key on-ballers Harry Allen, Beau Bennett, Angus McKenzie and Darcy McGregor remaining at the club, the change in personnel will force some adjustments in the way they move the ball, according to "Our midfield depth has probably been a

bit of an Achilles heel for us in the past and we've probably relied on our rebounding half-backs a bit much, so we're really hoping we can improve both in the clearances and around the ground," Sheahan said.

"Compared to previous seasons, we're probably going to be a little bit smaller in the forward line.

'It'll change the way we bring the ball inside our attacking 50 and instead of sitting it on the head of our key forwards, we might just have to lower our eyes and hit up the shorter target.

That said, I think it'll help our footy out a little bit if we're not a one-man band in the forward line and can spread the load a bit instead '

#### FROM THE COACH

"We want to be pushing to play finals still and at least be aiming for fourth or fifth - I think that's a realistic target for us. Injuries have hampered us these past couple of seasons, so keeping everyone fit and healthy and on the park will be a big focus as well."

SOME shrewd recruiting, along with the retention of their 2022 side, has put the spotlight on Nyah-Nyah West United as one of the early teams to watch this season.

While the Demons appear primed to be one of the Central Murray's big improvers, to those inside the four walls, it's been a slow and methodical process, with a long-term focus on youth development and local player retention set to finally bear fruit.

There will be eight new players who could potentially pull on a Demons guernsey for the first time – including new joint coach Nick O'Neill – when they host Koondrook-Barham in round 1, with fellow joint coach Corey Daniels excited about the new-look team the Demons recruiting committee managed to put together.

"An area we needed to target was both our midfield and our forward line and bolster both areas of the ground for us this season," Daniels said.

"We're also really excited about the return of 'Walshy' (Joel Walsh), alony with Dom Gallo and Nick O'Neill.

"Kayne Davidson's going to be really exciting for us and it will be exciting to see what he can do alongside his brother, Brady – although they're both very different players, with Kayne being more of an inside mid."

"We've recruited pretty heavily in that mid-forward bracket with players that can play both roles, which will only add to our versatility."

While NNW United's new faces will give them a fresh look, it's expected their real improvement will come from their homegrown talent that it's hoped will continue to develop with some more senior and hardened bodies now around the contest.

Charlie Boulton and Campbell Everitt are two such youngsters who appear ready for breakout seasons, after strong 2022 campaigns in the seniors, while Zach Threadgold and Joseph Violi are also well on the way to developing into solid senior contributors.

The biggest issue facing NNW United and their hopes of making a run at the finals could well be the same issue that stymied their 2022 campaign, with injuries already having an impact. The Demons will be without defender Dean Harrop for at least the first

five rounds of the season after ankle surgery – while of greater concern is the potential season-long absence of full back Cal Dobbin, who injured his ACL during training in recent months.

For Daniels, O'Neill and the NNW United brains trust, the focus now is on what they can control and not what they can't – and that includes the way they want to play the game.

"We're going to be able to run – we don't have a lot of height throughout the group, but we have a lot of midfielders and a lot of pace, so we'll be using that to our advantage," Daniels said.

"We've had a fairly big focus on improving our kicking and making good decisions with the ball and hopefully we can put that into match play as well."

"The other element to our game that we've been working on is our defensive pressure, we want to get the ball in our half of the ground and keep it in there – it's what the good sides have been able to do like Kerang and Woorinen and we want to do that, too."

"We feel like we've improved in that area and we've still got a fair way to go, but we want to be a strong defensive side as well."

#### FROM THE COACH

"It's all about taking the next step for us. It starts against Koondrook-Barham and hopefully we can get a win and go from there – but we're under no illusions that it's also going to take a lot of hard work along the way as well."

While finals are certainly on the radar, whether NNW United is absolutely ready to challenge for the top five is still questionable. They have done a remarkable job with recruiting and have certainly improved their depth, which they will need if they have another poor run with injuries like last season. They have a favourable draw, with only two double up games against last year's top five sides in Kerang and Lake Boga.

#### **KEY PLAYER**

Alex Erlandson: Can play forward, back or in the ruck and is without doubt the Demons' barometer. The former best and fairest will spend most of his time this season in defence, especially in the absence of Cal Dobbin. NNW United's dearth of talls will be an issue, meaning Erlandson will need to be at his absolute best every week if his team is to start climbing the ladder in 2023.


#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Charlie Boulton: Won last year's Central Murray Colts best and fairest in a canter and was one of his club's shining lights up forward by the end of last season. Played nine senior games in 2022, but saved his best for last, booting four of his side's five goals against Woorinen in the final round. Has been training with the Bendigo Pioneers this pre-season and exposure to a higher standard of football may well see the young Demon elevate his game.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

How big of a loss will Cal Dobbin be for the Demons down back?

At first glance, the loss of just one player wouldn't ordinarily be such a big concern, however Dobbin's impact on NNW United's defensive structure is seriously underrated. Compounding his absence is that of fellow key defender Dean Harrop, who will also miss the early rounds of the season with injury, leaving the Demons dangerously exposed down back. Dobbin's ability to read the play and shut down some of the Central Murray's best key forwards is impossible to replace - and the Demons may have to rely on their pressure further up the ground to help cover for their much-loved defender's absence.

IN order to secure their future. Swan Hill will turn to their past, with premiership coach Cal Beasy returning to lead the Swans for the first time since 2015.

Last season was one to forget for the competition's former powerhouse, finishing eighth and with a 5-11 record. The club has since made the call to rebuild, while at the same time planning to stay competitive and push for finals.

Beasy, who led Swan Hill's talented under-14s team to an undefeated premiership last season, seems the logical choice to take the reins as senior coach. And while realistic as to where his team currently sits, the new coach is also bullish about what the future holds for his home club.

"I'm pleased that I'm doing it, because there's a lot of good young kids coming through the club and they're going to need some good players to learn off over the next few years," Beasy said. "Watching them train together and getting better and fitter each week, it's good to see - I'm pretty excited about what they can achieve as a group.

"It's important for the future success of the footy club to bring these kids through and for them to be learning off the right guys every Tuesday and Thursday night.'

While the next generation of Swans will be a big focus in 2023, Beasy and his team are still bullish on their chances of an improved showing - with a solid pre-season of recruiting also under their belts.

Swan Hill's midfield, which has for a long time been reliant on veterans Matthew Wade and Xavier Moloney, has had a freshen up with former Werribee VFL onballer Brandon Houlihan's arrival. Joining him are a pair of premiership Tigers, with Nyawi Moore crossing over from Woorinen and Jose Miliado returning to the region after a couple of seasons with Macleod in the Northern Football League.

Also pulling on the maroon and white this season will be key forward Zach Mihocek from the North Shore Jets, with Beasy hopeful his new arrivals will give the Swans a more traditional structure.

'We've definitely lacked that bigger body and that predictability of a traditional key forward over the last few seasons and Zach (Mihocek) will provide that for us," Beasy said.

"Hopefully his presence will also help out

all the smaller crumbing forwards around him as well. 'Wadey' (Matthew Wade) and 'X' (Xavier Moloney) have shouldered the load through the middle for the last six or eight years - they deserve to not have to be the number one midfielder and get all the attention so 'Houls' (Brandon Houlihan) will definitely help and take a bit of the load off

The departures of the Makepeace brothers to Ultima, along with a season long shoulder injury to Xavier Mertz will hurt but shouldn't have a bearing on the way the Swans play according to Beasy, whose message to his players will be a simple one.

You work too hard to get the ball and to turn it over with a skill error, it is a bit of a bug bear of mine - so it's something we'll work hard on leading up to and right throughout the season," Beasy said.

"If we can decrease our turnovers, it lends itself to owning more of the ball and therefore owning more of the game, so once you're in a bit more control, things sort of go vour wav.

"I'd like to see us play a more open, hard running brand of footy and not only use the ball better, but be more direct going inside our forward 50."

#### FROM THE COACH

"We just want to improve on last year and become a more consistent side - we finished off the year okay, but just lost too many games through turning the ball over. We just want to be a bit more competitive and look to get back into the finals and see where we go from there."

It's fair to say that Swan Hill's list is in a transitional stage. While they have quality young players, they are still too young to make a meaningful contribution at senior level. Their list also contains a large number of older veterans – all of whom have been terrific servants of the club, but also not likely to improve any further. While their list is good enough to challenge for the five, their back six without Mertz is a concern - and if Brendan Blackmore and Tom Corridan play limited games, then it could be a bridge too far.

#### **KEY PLAYER**

Matthew Wade: Although closer to the end than the start, last season's club best and fairest is still one of the most damaging and impactful players in the Central Murray. His ability to dominate a match out of the centre square, then be just as effective forward, is almost unmatched. It remains to be seen how big of an impact relieving himself of the rigours of coaching will have on his game, but if his form continues in a similar fashion from last season, he may well be a three-time Jack Betts Medallist.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Jarvis Keogh: Keogh was one of the finds of the year in 2022, with a top five finish in the Swans' best and fairest a true reflection of how good a year he had. After setting such a high standard, it's hard to see how he can possibly take his game to another level - but by all reports, Keogh has put in a huge pre-season and will once again by one to watch.

#### THE BURNING QUESTION

Where should the Swans play Xavier Moloney - forward or mid?

One of the silkiest and most elegant players in the Central Murray league. Moloney has been slowly transitioning from the midfield to attack over the past few years. His 2022 numbers as a forward are deceiving, kicking just 14 goals from all 16 games – but also spending the majority of the second half of the year as a permanent midfielder. The arrival of Brandon Houlihan, Jose Miliado and Nyawi Moore may well free up Moloney to spend more time forward, where the defender who opposes him will spend the four quarters a nervous wreck.

ALTHOUGH coming from a long way back, Tooleybuc-Manangatang could well be the surprise packet of season 2023 – with a number of quality recruits set to turn around the fortunes of last year's wooden spooners.

After enduring the year from hell, the Saints have left no stone unturned in their quest to climb up the ladder this season, bringing in up to seven potentially gamechanging recruits – including former North Melbourne midfielder-forward Josh Williams and Gold Coast Suns academy player Kwaby Boakye.

Joining the former AFL-listed pair are midfielders Ethan Goldfinch and Blake Grant, ruckman Tim Auckland, small forward Trey Clark and key defender Jaicob Kenny, who also spent time with both the Gold Coast Suns and Southport Sharks in the NEAFL. It's not just the Saints' new faces that have given them cause for optimism, but also the return of some familiar faces – with Mitch Grant, Jack Templeton and 2022 recruit Jack Mazzarella all returning from knee injuries, as well as the return of key forward Tom Spicer from Swan Hill.

With a vastly different look about them, it will no doubt take the Saints a number of weeks to gel – but it's a problem that senior coach Dean Helmers is looking forward to.

"We go into this year as a bit of an unknown, but probably the big thing for us will be just having the ability to move magnets around," Helmers said.

"Our training standards were pretty good last year, but we'd get to game day and we'd be competitive and have a good plan, but as soon as we started our rotations, we'd get blown away.

"This year, we're going to have the opportunity to turn up on game day with those same good plans and training under our belt, but we'll be able to rotate and throw guys around and come up with a few tricks which should enable us to be competitive against every side."

While best and fairest Alex Powell's return to Strathfieldsaye will hurt, as will the departures of Shylo Smith (East Sunbury) and Billy Bentley (Macorna), but there is no doubting the Saints are extremely well positioned for a vastly improved season. While Helmers would be disappointed if his side isn't

at least in the finals picture come season's end – he is also realistic about how much work is ahead of his players.

"We'll try to play a really well structured brand of football, be defensively minded and set up well behind the ball – but at the same time, move the ball quickly with smart running patterns," Helmers said.

"Our game style will change a fair bit from last year – not just because there's new players coming in, but because we had no height whatsoever last season and now we have about six or seven guys that are well over six foot.

"There'll be a lot more longer kicking and we'll be playing to our strengths, whereas last year was about having a solid game plan and sticking to it for as long as we could.

"We've been starved of genuine success for a while. If we can get a few early wins on the board, then who knows?

"Every team is really well coached in this competition and they all have elite players, but sometimes it just comes down to who wants it more – if we can be hungry for the contest and willing to scrap, then that just might get us over the line at times, too."

#### FROM THE COACH

"With the quality that we've brought into the side and the locals that are returning from injury, we have to be looking at playing finals, I believe. We've got some confidence in the fact that we'll be hard to beat and we'll at least be competitive in most games this season."

DESPITE taking big strides last season. Tyntynder's elimination final fadeout could well be the defeat that spurs them to greater heights in 2023.

While the Bulldogs improved significantly last year, they will find the going much tougher when round 1 kicks off, with some significant departures set to have a big bearing. The loss of Marcus Wattie will be felt the hardest, with the dynamic midfielder having left the kennel in the off-season, along with the Sala brothers, Tom Gilbert and Solomon McKay.

What the Doggies have lost in speed and run, they have gained in size, with the return of their former coach Justin Ellis to play alongside the re-signed Jason Eagle, as well as the recruitment of Darwin Buffaloes Tyrone Bean who can play as either a key position or running defender

While the change in personnel will also cause a shift in style, Tyntynder coach Josh Stone is adamant that his side will be better placed than 12 months ago.

"We've lost a bit of midfield depth, but the few guys we've recruited are going to help us with our structure a lot more than last year," Stone said. "Even with losing guys like Tom (Sala) and Marcus (Wattie), I'm confident we'll go pretty well, as there's a lot of talent among the group, especially among a few of the younger boys.

"We seem to have a lot of big blokes this year, whereas last year we were pretty small we've lost a little bit of pace, but if we can move the ball quick then I don't think you necessarily need leg speed.

"We've just tweaked a couple of things, which is normal for most teams - we didn't want to do exactly what we did last year because I felt we got found out a couple of times with different aspects of our game, like pushing forward too hard and then not having guys able to get back in defence.

The addition of Bean will further strengthen an otherwise strong defence, with Patrick and Cayden Crowe, Elliott Broad and Tate Hulland all pulling on the red, white and blue guernsey again. Add Jackson Morris, who should return for the second half of the season from injury, and the Bulldogs have options aplenty.

Elia Ware will be another key player for Tyntynder following his best and fairest win last season and should once again take the mantle as the Doggies' No.1 ruckman.

Of greater concern is their lack of a top midfielder, following the departures of Wattie

Brodie Bennett, Darcy Bibby, Ben Hallam and Kyle Brasser are all quality players, but none possess the ability to rip a game open. The one player who is capable of that is Stone, who had a season severely interrupted by injury last year and will be desperate to get himself fit and back into the midfield. While the squad they've assembled can once again press for finals, Stone and his coaching staff will be doing everything in their power to make sure lightning doesn't strike twice.

"That (elimination final) loss will certainly be what drives us this year," Stone said.

One of the worst things that happened to us was we knew we were playing finals three weeks before they started and we just didn't have the right attitude. We've changed a bit of our game plan with regard to that, because teams were running all over us by season's

"Hopefully, making those adjustments will allow us to compete with some of the better sides and enable us to defend better, rather than being all-out attack all of the time.'

"Our expectation is to win a final this year. While we made it into the finals last year, our finish to the season wasn't what we wanted – it was disappointing and we need to learn from it and improve on it this season."

A tougher fixture means a repeat performance of last season will be much harder for the Doggies. Games against an improved Balranald, Woorinen, Koondrook-Barham, Lake Boga and Kerang in their first five rounds could easily see them start the season 1-4 and from there, it's a long road back. While Tyrone Bean is a jet and will be a massive inclusion, they have still lost serious class and depth in Wattie, Sala and Solomon McKay. It's hard to see Tyntynder improving based on their departures, and although they won't go backwards, they're certainly vulnerable to those who finished below them - such as Balranald - going past them.

#### **KEY PLAYER**

Elia Ware: Showed just how good a player he was last year in winning Tyntynder's best and fairest. Can play any position on the ground, but saved his best football in 2022 for when he was in the ruck – and although he will likely start there again, the Doggies could get creative and play him solely as a running midfielder. Is as fit and athletic as any ruckman in the league and could easily make the transition to playing as an oldfashioned ruck-rover - with his ability to cover the ground for a man of his size simply incredible.

#### **BIG IMPROVER**

Isaiah Bull: Has speed to burn and will no doubt get more midfield minutes with spots in the Doggies engine room opening up. Loves to take the game on and will be required to do exactly that as one of the few x-factor players in the side. Spent time in defence late last season, including at full back, and was impressive - but can have a larger impact on the game up the ground.

#### THE BURNING OUESTION

Will the return of Justin Ellis help ease the load on Jason Eagle?

There's no denying Tyntynder had an unhealthy reliance on spearhead Jason Eagle last season - and it was this fact that saw them found out in the final against Lake Boga, when he was clearly hampered by injury. While Ellis is closer to the end of his career than the start - as is fellow key forward Josh Dwyer they can both provide a strong alternative to Eagle. How they all work together will be interesting to watch.

AFTER running out of legs in last year's preliminary final, perennial finalists Woorinen will be looking to reclaim their throne – and another piece of silverware.

With two-time premiership coach Marcus Demaria continuing for a ninth straight season, the Tigers will again be one of the teams to beat – with both old and new faces set to further improve an already imposing playing list.

Last season saw Woorinen place a heavy emphasis on developing talented juniors, with Robert Rush, Henry Thompson, Matthew Gardner, Mitch Uhlhorn and Matthew King all playing full seasons in the seniors. The Tigers have also made clear their intent to secure their third flag since 2018 with some shrewd recruiting set to fill a number of identified gaps.

Former premiership Tigers Doug Beames and Lachlan Warburton will return in 2023, after both players spent last year plying their trade with Modewarre in the Bellarine Football League. Joining them will be key forward Ben Hunt (Thurgoona), midfielder-forward William Collicoat (Quambatook) and utility Dylan Godwin (Noosa). And Demaria is especially excited at the potential of former Montmorency midfielder-forward Danko Bzenic.

"He (Bzenic) played two years under Craig McRae in the VFL at Richmond and his footy IQ is through the roof," Demaria said. "He's played a really high standard of footy in the past and just uses the ball so well – we'll probably look at playing him 60 per cent in the midfield and 40 per cent up forward and have him working in partnership with Veszpremi at times."

While Woorinen have recruited well, the news isn't all good, with the Tigers also losing key players over the off-season – Lachie Wright (Sandhurst), Regan Vesty (Hoppers Crossing), Nyawi Moore (Swan Hill) and Aaron Cadd (retired) all having departed the den.

After their preliminary final fadeout, the Tigers have gone back to the drawing board. While they will still play with the same short passing, high possession game style in 2023, it's also expected their new recruits will have a positive impact on the way they move the ball forward.

"We've looked to beef up our midfield because our depth through there was a bit of a deficiency last year," Demaria said.

"Bringing in Danko (Bzenic) will help and Lachie Warburton will spend a bit of time in

there this season alongside Jye (Barry), Robbie (Miller), 'Doey' (Josh Domaille) and (Patrick) Veszpremi.

"Mitch Uhlhorn's another one who'll run through our rotations as well, especially after his efforts late last season playing on-ball.

"Every year we make adjustments – we had a look back and analysed a few areas that didn't quite work for us after last season, particularly the way we moved the ball inside our forward fifty with a dearth of options in attack.

"That's no disrespect to the guys that played down there, but we basically had to dump-kick the ball inside 50, compete and then let our crumbing players try and lock it in and press up behind the footy – which against the better teams, was predictable.

"So, we've made some adjustments in that area of our game and having a couple of changes in personnel will also help in that aspect."

#### FROM THE COACH

"We've proven that we're a successful side over a long period of time and our aim has always been to finish in the top three every year and play finals. We'll have a strong emphasis on our junior development program again as well, but in terms of on the field, we want to be playing finals and giving ourselves every chance of winning it."

If not for injuries to some key players late last season, the Tigers story could have been written very differently. 
#### **KEY PLAYER**

AFTER finally getting that winning feeling, Balranald will be desperate for more when they hit the court as reigning premiers for the first time in their club's history.

Breaking through for their first A Grade premiership in the Central Murray-Mid Murray competition last season, the Roos will become the hunted instead of the hunter – especially considering the bulk of their squad are young and developing players.

But while success may be a foreign concept for Balranald's netballers, so too is expectation – and it's something the playing group will have to contend with, according to premiership coach Jess Parry.

"Last year we wanted all seven positions on our team to be strong, so we shuffled our team around at times and got girls in those positions to be confident and playing to their strengths.

"That will be the aim again this year – I think if you want to be a successful team, you can't necessarily have a weak link hiding anywhere on the court."

While both Taylin Barry and Jordyn Jolliffe are expected to miss the season with knee injuries, Balranald will still possess experienced heads Elli-Jane Brougham (GK) and Parry (GA) at either end of the court.

With the perfect mix of youth, talent and fitness – as well as finals experience – the Roos are perfectly placed to ensure their second premiership doesn't take as long to win as their first.



AFTER taking giant strides forward last season, the next big step for Cohuna is the finals - and it's one they're desperate to take in 2023.

The Kangas finished last season in seventh, with five-and-a-half wins placing them a game and a half outside the top five. While 2022 was a much-improved performance from a team who has spent many vears in the bottom half of the ladder, it could have been so different had results over the past month of the season gone their way.

A six-goal loss to eventual runners-up Swan Hill is all the proof needed to show that Cohuna's best form can match it with the best - before a 41-goal tie with NNW United and then a three-goal loss to Woorinen all but torpedoed their finals dreams.

"We've been training a lot in the weeks leading up to the season and learning how to finish a game off - hopefully those smallmargin losses will be a thing of the past after we've tweaked a few little things within our game plan.'

With Cohuna having retained the bulk of their playing list from last season, Dye will have a fairly settled line-up at her disposal, one that has spent a number of years playing together. It's that cohesion that helped the Kangas' form improve markedly 12 months ago and their new coach hopes that trend will continue.

'There's about five or so girls that are in the A Grade side that have been playing together for the last four or five years now and they've all worked out how each other plays and built a strong bond over that time," Dye

"We've added a bit of depth in our goals and our defence over the years, but it's having those connections that has definitely paid off – we can only build on what we can and keeping teams together over time only builds that cohesion.

Keely Wilson will return in defence after her career-best season and again combine with Danni Sawyer. At the other end of the court, Carmen Dye and Kobie McIvor will again be under the goals for the Kangas.

While Ellena Findlay, Anthea Toma and Tannah Keely controlled the midcourt last season for Cohuna, 2023 may bring the emergence of the next generation of Kangas netballers ushered through the senior ranks. Among those set to get their opportunity include Taylor Hird and Sammi Moon, with both players having been selected in the Kangas' A squad, along with a much-improved Jorja Henry.

After going winless and with an average losing margin of 33 goals a game, it's fair to say last season was one to forget for the River Raiders. While the stats don't make great reading, they also don't tell the true story, with the young Raiders showing considerable improvement by season's end. "Like any new coach that comes to a club, you're going to change some aspects of your team's play - be it with regard to court craft or skill sets and we're in the process of doing that now with our coaching group," Matthews said.

"We're just looking to enhance and implement a few changes in our game plan and that will help us be a lot more competitive - certainly with a big focus on our decision-making and responsibility for our own positions.

"We'll be looking to promote within the club some opportunities for some of our younger players to play seniors again, which is similar to last season.

"A lot of them got a taste of senior netball throughout the various senior grades last year and I think we'd like to encourage that again while we're in this development phase of the club - and not only just present opportunities for the juniors, but the same also applies for some of the senior players to play up a level as well."

While Koondrook-Barham will retain the bulk of their squad from last season, there

will be one big inclusion, with former Raider Sid Dyer returning to her home club following a stint with Quambatook. Not only does Dyer return in a playing capacity, where she will provide run and drive through the midcourt, she will assume the role of A Reserve coach and A Grade assistant coach.

Dyer will most likely form a strong combination with fellow midcourt players Hayley Reading and youngster Tess Doyle, who has been earmarked as a player to watch this season. Another key player for the Raiders is stalwart Tlarnee Lake, who will again be partnered with another youngster, Remi Doyle, in goals.

The only downside may be at the defensive end of the court for Koondrook-Barham. While Sassi-Jo McGrath is confirmed as returning to wear the GK bib, the same cannot be said for reigning club best and fairest Rach Robertson, who at the time of print was still weighing up her playing future.



ON the back of one of the closest A Grade seasons in recent history, Lake Boga will again be one of the teams to beat this year.

After pressing their claims for much of last season as one of the four teams to beat, the Magpies eventually came up short – with a three-goal loss to eventual premiers Balranald in extra time ending their season in heartbreaking fashion.

While Balranald would go on to win their club's first A Grade Central Murray premiership, it left Lake Boga chasing theirs.

While safe in the knowledge that they aren't far off the competition's best sides, losses such as the semi-final can also galvanise a playing group – which is exactly what new coach Anne-Marie Stewart is hoping occurs to the Magpies.

"Losing any final is tough, but like all players that have experienced a loss, it does make you enjoy the wins so much better," Stewart said.

With Anna Archie departing as coach and player during the off-season, the Magpies appointed Stewart to lead them in 2023.

Despite having had a lengthy break from coaching, Stewart needs no introduction, having previously coached both Woorinen and Swan Hill to premierships, along with a representative coaching history that includes junior and senior Interleague and regional teams

Her appointment did not come until February, and Stewart acknowledged that both she and her players had plenty of ground to cover, with round 1 a matter of weeks away.

But, despite the late start, the veteran coach was also effusive in her praise of the playing group.

"I was only appointed a few weeks back

"I was only appointed a few weeks back, but training has been really good so far," Stewart said.

"I've been impressed with the girls' willingness to improve their fitness, to learn new drills and just how organised the netball club is – it has certainly made my job so much easier

"In terms of how I'd like to see us play this season, I think all players should have a good mix of both attacking and defensive skills – and we'll be working hard on that during the homeand-away season."

The departure of Archie will not only leave a big hole to be filled in the Magpies' midcourt, but also in on-court leadership and experience.



Exacerbating that problem will be the departure of experienced defender Felicity Robertson, whose partnership with Jemma Meehan a key factor in Lake Boga's good form last year.

The Magpies have a ready-made

Robertson replacement walking through the doors, with Tyntynder defender Maddy Gleeson pulling on the black and white in 2023, along with Tooleybuc-Manangatang's Kara Leirich.

While Gleeson and Leirich are great pick-

ups for Lake Boga, without doubt their biggest inclusion is Holly Hogan with the former Magpie returning to her home club.

Where Hogan best fits into the line-up is the biggest unknown, given the former league best-and-fairest runner-up is capable of playing any position on the court.

With both Sarah and Katie Hepburn returning in goals, Hogan could well be used through the midcourt to help cover the loss of Archie – and where she would also be the perfect foil for both Lily Brennan, Emma Peacock and Taigan O'Shannassy.



AFTER just missing the finals and with an influx of talent, NNW United are hoping this is the year they finally see September action.

After spending many years wedded to the bottom rungs of the A Grade ladder, the Demons finally rose to greater heights last season – finishing sixth and just a game and a half outside the top five. "The disappointment of missing finals will also be a bit of a driving force for us this season.

"I think last year kind of shocked the girls at what they could achieve and I think the playing group have certainly found a bit of

hunger over the pre-season to not be happy with that."

Reigning club best and fairest Mitchell will return, along with midcourt runner Shania Decker.

Also returning for another season at Nyah will be goalies Denise Snyder and Bridie Curran, with their developing combination of youth and experience impressing their coach ahead of a massive season for the Demons.

REDEMPTION will be the buzz word at Swan Hill this year after their heartbreaking two-goal grand final loss, with the Swans hellbent on going one step further in 2023.

After being widely held as the team to beat for much of last season, Swan Hill fell agonisingly short of breaking an eight-year premiership drought, in a grand final that will be remembered for many years to come. But while that game is fresh in the minds of all who witnessed it, it's all but a distant memory for a Swans outfit that is hungry to return the competition powerhouse to the top of the tree.

For Madeleine Nalder – who will once again team up with Kelsey McCoy and Mollie Quin as joint coaches of the Swans - it's all about preparation and planning.

"Obviously it hurt losing last year, but this year is a fresh start for us and that's how we're treating it - a new year and a new challenge," Nalder said.

"We're moving forward and the focus from this point on is on 2023 and just worrying about getting this season right and getting our squads right.

"In terms of last year, I guess we can learn things from our own game. But in terms of our opposition, lots of things will have changed, so we'll have to be flexible and move with the

"Everyone starts the new season at zero and that's the beauty of it - we'll just go back to the basics and build as best we can across all four senior teams and build our depth and develop where we can and continue to strengthen what we already have."

One major contributor who won't be there is Zoe Livingston, with the midcourt star heading south to Kerang this season. Livingston will be a loss, but should be covered by any number of talented juniors coming up through the Swans' ranks, according to Nalder.

"Zoe (Livingston) was a huge contributor for us across a number of years and there's no doubt she'll be difficult to replace with a likefor-like replacement," Nalder said.

"I feel like we can develop some depth and that gap in the centre will just create an opportunity for either an existing A Grade player to make the switch, or someone new to come in and fill her role."

While Swan Hill will look to rebuild their midcourt from within - they can hardly be

accused of sitting on their hands when it comes to recruitment either, with goalies Zoe Morris (Tooleybuc-Manangatang), Jenna Jenkins (Ultima) and Kelly Stanger (returning) all pulling on the maroon and white this season.

With the same coaching structure and a very similar line-up, Nalder doesn't envisage too many changes to the Swans' structure or game style and is keen to back to her club's winning formula to get them through another season

"We like playing it hard, but fair at the same time," Nalder said.

"We like to think we pride ourselves on our teamwork and we've had a lot of consistency with a number of players having played together over a long period of time - we've got some really great connections between our players and that's something that often helps us out on the court."

AFTER an exodus of key players, Tooleybuc-Manangatang will turn to local talent this season in order to kick start their rebuild.

In the finals hunt for much of last year, the Saints could have been considered a possible bolter for 2023, despite winning just one of their last five matches and finishing eighth.

But now, with four of their regular starters from last year's side not returning, those hopes of being a finals contender would appear all but dashed – even before a game's been played.

A Grade best and fairest Zoe Morris has departed for Swan Hill, while fellow goalie Carlee Hazlett crossed over to Woorinen, leaving Tooleybuc-Manangatang without a recognized goal scorer.

It isn't just the attacking end of the court that has been hit by departures however, with goal keeper and talented youngster Taylen Blachford also moving clubs, this time to rivals Nyah-Nyah West United. The Saints will also be without Kara Leirich, who has moved to Lake Boga, and mid-courter Peyton Oliver, who was unsure of her netballing future.

With a lot of outs and not many ins, the situation leaves A Grade coach Mel Wait having to turn to her club's youth to fill the gaps.

Thankfully for the Saints, the future looks bright, with their junior teams experiencing a purple patch of form last season – culminating in a grand final appearance for the under-16s.

"We've got pretty strong juniors and a strong junior development program – we had some really good results at a junior level last season," Wait said.

"We want to continue to work with those girls and give them opportunities to play senior netball which will be really important for both us as a club going forward and also their own personal development.

"Last year we had Jayda Plant and Olivia Fowler play A Grade and both of those girls will get opportunities to play again this year.

"Laura Zanker's not a junior, but she's another one who will get plenty of opportunity as she comes back from injury and hopefully she'll be ready to play early in the season – she only played the first half of last season, so she'll be a significant in for us and will make a big difference to our structure."

While Wait is set to fast-track the

development of a number of her players, the experienced coach is also bullish about a couple of her more experienced players, with both Amy Standen and Millie Holland continuing with the Saints in 2023. "We'll have a pretty consistent midcourt

combination with Amy (Standen) and Millie (Holland) returning – Jayda (Plant) can also fill some of those gaps and run through there," Wait said.

"Jayda could also play in goals as well,

she's very versatile, while we'll most likely be looking to use some of our under-18 players to fill the other goalie positions.

"It's going to be a year of recruiting from within and developing our juniors, that's our one and only focus this season.

"We're really keen to give all of them an opportunity and watch them grow and develop – we're under no illusions that it'll be tough from a win-loss perspective, but at the same time it's quite exciting to see how they'll go – it'll be good for their development."

Gleeson will be the hardest loss to cover

however for Tyntynder, with her defensive smarts going to be sorely missed. Her departure is also set to put Nicola Miliano under some pressure in defence - with Miliano likely to be a permanent fixture in the GK bib this season.

With so many changes in personnel from last season to this, Lawry will be leaning on a couple of her leaders on each line to help drive the team's standards.

"I've been blown away by how mature both Nicola (Miliano) and Toni (Rivett) are to be honest," Lawry said.







"Our sides are shaping up fairly different to the previous season, but I believe this year will be a good year to boost our club growth and development," Hicks said.



"Our best 18 last year was competitive, but we just weren't able to get them on the park very often because we had a lot of injuries and we just didn't have any depth," Billett said.

"We've really added to our depth and that, along with our midfield, will be an area of our growth this season – while we don't want to get too excited, we know we'll be better than last vear."


While Wilson will lead their A Grade side,

AFTER enduring a few seasons in the wilderness, things are looking on the right track at Leitchville-Gunbower.

They'll be under the tutelage of a new general in experienced coach Shannon Keam, whose seasoned resume is perfect for the young list he's adopted.

Keam knows how to build finals sides – he tasted premiership success at Moama in 2010 while also taking Cohuna and Robinvale to

He'll have a massive job to get to that point, though, with the Bombers winning only one game in the past two seasons.

It has, however, been a positive preseason for the Bombers, with good numbers at training and Keam setting the standards expected of senior footballers.

The brief of what we wanted to do over summer was getting guys on the track and build our depth, which I feel we've gone a long way to doing," Keam said. "The team hasn't performed that well in the past couple of years, so it's just about implementing a few simple things like requiring attendance at training to earn your spot in the side.'

There is an air of excitement on the track at the Bombers, with the majority of last season's list re-signing, including reigning best and fairest ruckman Jobee Ward and leading goalkicker Billy Hawken.

They'll be joined by a host of returning locals making the pilgrimage home.

"We wanted to get as many local blokes back to the club as possible," Keam said.

"We've been able to do that, so it's looking more likely by the week blokes will be fighting for their spots at selection."

Highlighting the returning crop are the Keath brothers, Jye and Riley.

Former captain and best and fairest winner Jye heads home after being named in the West Gippsland Football League Team of the Year for Bunyip in 2022, while brother Riley joins after a runner-up in La Trobe Amateurs best and fairest last year.

"They both ooze leadership," Keam said.

"The way Jye leads in his actions is exactly what we needed to raise the bar at training and hopefully gameday."

Another pair of brothers is set to help Keam, and his young group take strides forward, with Nick and Chris Horman joining in leadership roles from Kinglake.

Chris is a hardworking key forward who'll take on a player-assistant coaching role, whilst Nick will oversee the next generation coaching the under-18s before utilising his midfield talents in the seniors later in the day.

"It's good to have a couple of older heads with a calming influence around the young guys - especially after they missed big development years during COVID,"

It isn't all good news on the recruiting front, with the bulk of the 2022 season signings departing, including Leyton Shenfield (travel), Blake Azzopardi (Moulamein) and Sam Lewis (Strathmerton).

Whilst Keam was coy about detailing the brand of footy he'll be implementing, he does foresee the midfield being the Bombers big area of improvement.

The addition of a couple hard running midfielders in, the returning Jim Brererton from Melbourne and signing Clay McGregor from Moama, will be huge for the Bombers.

"Our midfield rotation will have a lot more depth - we should be able to get ten guys through the guts this season," he said.

"Bringing Jim back, Clay in and a few of the young blokes I'm expecting to step up will allow us to throw guys in there for 15 minutes and not have to go back to the well of the same guys."

## Pioneers building strong local connections

WHILE they may not be playing in Swan Hill this year, the Bendigo Pioneers will still have a strong local connection in 2023.

Former Tooleybuc player and Nyah-Nyah West United premiership star Danny O'Bree is entering his third season in charge of the Pioneers boys' program, former Swan Hill College teacher Whitney Kennedy will be head coach of the women's program and another former NNW United product, Rick Coburn, has been appointed to the role of talent operations

Coburn, who coached the Pioneers between 2017 and 2019, took over the role from the late David Meade, who sadly died last October after a private battle with cancer. With the

Pioneers mourning the loss of their much-loved figurehead. Coburn - who held the role of AFL state coaching manager - saw it as the perfect opportunity to return "home" and continue the work and vision of his great mate.

"David (Meade) didn't just do an amazing job over a long period of time with the Pioneers, he was also a remarkable human being period,"

"Our involvement together goes back to when David was my runner when I was coaching the Pioneers – from there, he took over the program and drove it to higher standards and a level that the club had simply never reached

"I certainly won't be filling his shoes, as those shoes are impossible to fill - we all miss him, but we'll carry on Meady's work the best we can and honour him that way."

A key project of Meade's that Coburn wants to continue is the Pioneers' movement away from being regarded as a Bendigo-centric organisation. Under Meade, the Pioneers strengthened their ties with the Central Murray, Sunraysia and Goulburn Murray regions, establishing satellite bases in Swan Hill, Mildura and Echuca, as well as playing games in those

"It's such a big region, we really do cover so much of north-west Victoria and southern NSW and although it can be a challenge at times, there are some really good kids right across those areas," Coburn said.

"It's really important that we aren't just the Bendigo Pioneers, that we're the regional Pioneers that cover the Central Murray area

with just as much work and effort as we do Sunraysia, or the Goulburn Murray, North Central, or Bendigo areas.

"Sometimes the four regional centres can stretch us a bit thin with staff, especially when you consider a lot of the other Talent League regions might have one or two bases at most so we like to think we do the best we can with all of our areas, while knowing that it can be a challenge to do so."

So with the new season set to kick off, just what is the main aim of the Pioneers? Are they like any other football club, that trades on the wins, losses and week-to-week performance of the team? Or, being the rung underneath AFL level, is their success based on finding as many players as possible a home on an AFL list? Well, according to O'Bree, it's neither.

"While my job is titled regional development coach, it's really not about just developing AFL talent, nor is it about only improving the standard of footy within our region - it's really about focusing on developing our people, developing our players, staff, coaches within our region," O'Bree said.

"It's not about wins and losses, Whitney and I are probably the most fortunate people in coaching in that we're not going to get sacked if we lose every game - we'll get sacked if we stop developing the talent and stop developing the people in our program, and not just from a football perspective.

"I'm pretty passionate about our region, having lived in nearly all parts of it over my lifetime, and we need to understand that in order to improve football in our region, we need to drive better standards - which will eventually drive better outcomes."

Coburn agreed.

"Certainly, the program is designed to work on the person as a whole - in other words, better person equals better player or better player equals better person, we take a holistic approach in that regard," he said.

"The one trait that AFL clubs and ourselves are looking for in young people is selfmotivation.

"This is probably advice to young people in general - you've got to drive yourself and be self-motivated if you are going to do well in whatever it is you want to do.

"We try to give opportunities the best we can - but know that if players, whether they are in our program or not, if they have drive and self-motivation, they're going to do good

The Talent League girls team are already up to round 3 this season, having played both the Murray Bushrangers and GWV Rebels in their opening two rounds.

Kennedy said she also had a clear directive on developing the person first and player

It's a trait that, as a former PE teacher, Kennedy has long honed.

"The most important thing for me is enjoyment," she said.

"Being happy and enjoying your time in footy is the No.1 priority, as I think you'll only get the best out of yourself and out of each other if you're happy and you're enjoying the opportunity - and the same goes for the coaching staff as well.

"I do feel a sense of responsibility to set a good example for these young women, but I think that enjoyment and love of the sport is going to become even more important as the sport starts to grow.

"Breezer' (O'Bree) and I are really clear on the culture we want set at the Bendigo Pioneers and that's really important to me – we want to set standards and expectations and give those young men and women in our program the best opportunity to develop both on and off the field."

O'Bree said he felt passionate about the Swan Hill region for many reasons.

"A lot of kids that are coming through the system now are kids of parents that I've either played footy with, or went to school with, or played footy against, so it's pretty cool to see life come full circle," he said.

'You sort of want those kids to succeed just as much as anyone, but it can be challenging when you have to move them on or make a hard call – but by the same token, it's also pretty cool when you get to work closely with them and be a key part of their footballing life

# Onus on clubs to cover critical umpire shortage

IT'S no secret heading into the 2023 season that the Central Rivers Umpires (CRU), like most leagues, face a significant shortage in their ranks.

Since last season, the CRU has lost nearly a dozen central umpires and almost half of their goal umpires.

With the shortage reaching concerning levels, CRU coach Brent Howden said they would have to get creative to ensure three umpires can take the field for all games every week.

"At the moment, we're looking at having two umpires and a club-affiliated one – if we don't have enough to do that, the radio games of the round will be prioritised – and the other matches will just have to get through somehow." he said.

"If we could run 16 central umpires, that would mean two at every game – that wouldn't be too bad because each home team could throw in an umpire."

Howden said club-affiliated umpires would be well looked after.

"If we can get club-affiliated people, we're more than happy for them to stay at their clubs, or if they'd prefer, we'll accommodate them to do other games," he said.

"It's not all doom and gloom - there's

plenty of positives to it – we've just got to get people on side."

The umpiring fraternity is always on the lookout for new members to join them in the best seats in the house.

Howden highlighted the often-forgotten positives of being an umpire.

"It's a good confidence boost – to be able to interact with players, coaches and clubs – it broadens your horizons," he said.

"It's a great job – it's just the stigma of being an umpire that I think turns people off – but the relationships you make from it are well worth it."

Training is on Wednesday nights from 6pm at Alan Garden Reserve, with matchday appointments being made on a weekly basis.

If you are keen to give it a go, you can head down on Wednesday night and speak to Howden.


The Central Rivers are currently developing an anti-abuse campaign for the CRU to promote the importance of taking a stand against the scourge that umpires face weekly.



#### 14. Ben Booth (Woorinen)





## Tigers step into new territory

THERE'S no denying that women's football is one of the fastest growing sports in the country – and locally, there's one club that's leading the

For the past seven seasons, Woorinen have been at the forefront of women's football, having entered a team every year since 2015 in the Bendigo Junior Football League's Under 18 Youth girls competition. With two premierships in that time, the Woorinen program has been a raging success on the field. But off it, there was one glaring problem – where do the girls go once they became too old to play?

That is no longer an issue at the Tigers, with Woorinen now entering a side in the CVFL Women's competition this season. It now completes the women's football pathway at the Tigers, with girls as young as eight now able to pull on the Woorinen jumper and wear

it all the way through to adulthood.

The opportunity for Woorinen to enter a team this year in the seniors competition came through the unfortunate disbanding of the Kerang women's team. Woorinen have stepped in to fill the void, giving those who played with the Blues a place to continue their footballing journey.

"At the end of last year we had those two or three girls that were too old for youth girls and we were saying how sad it was that they were going to head off and never play for Woorinen again," said Jason Murphy, who will be joint coach of the women's teams and also coach of the youth girls.

So that was sort of what drove it a little bit - we were like, well they should be able to continue on in our colours, but to complete that pathway now is pretty cool.

There's probably about six or seven players that haven't come across from

Kerang, but we hope they will come across to us eventually, we'd certainly love them to play for us.

"We just wanted to get it off the ground so they had the option to play footy this year really - normally if you have a year off, you rarely get players back."

Former Woorinen youth girls player Katelyn Hazlett will join Murphy as joint coach of the women's team.

The youth team has kept the bulk of their squad together after making it all the way to the preliminary final last season.

We had 11 players in the original Pioneers squad, which was then cut down to five at the final announcement, which is pretty good," Murphy said.

'That gives us some strength about knowing what we are going to be looking like - and particularly this year with Pioneers playing over the top of our season, we're

going to be losing those five girls almost weekly.

"That's where those other six girls will need to be pick up the slack, as well as some of the young guns we've brought in. "With the momentum we built last year,

we've sort of only lost a couple of top-age girls, so we have got pretty much the same team again."

As for the journey that women's football is taking, Murphy couldn't be prouder to be a part of it - and implored anyone who isn't already to get on board in 2023.

"Women's footy is thriving at the moment," Murphy said.

The numbers are great, the energy is really good and we're getting great support from the club - they are right behind it.'

"Tim Phillips, the new president, has been right behind us getting the women's team up, so it is really exciting to be part of it."


