

Swans flag a classic thriller

IN a game that had everything from ups and downs to injuries to overtime, last year's Central Murray A Grade grand final was certainly one for the history books.

While Swan Hill have been no strangers to winning over the years, this victory was one that meant a lot to the entire team.

"We had been up and around, we'd had some heartbreaks with some losses in grand finals, played in a few preliminary finals and things like that across the journey," Swans premiership coach and player Madeleine Nalder said

"It had been a long time coming for some of us, and some of us wondered whether we would

ever actually win one again.

"To do it was obviously amazing, but even better to be able to do it with the group of girls that we had, and I'm not just talking about the players that took to the court that day, as we had a lot of different players in our team throughout the year.

"I think I probably speak for everyone when I say it was a special one for all of us."

The 2023 premiership win was Swan Hill's 10th, but their first in nearly 10 years.

The Swans went into the match as the underdogs, taking on minor premiers Lake Boga, who had only lost one game for the entire

When regular time finished with the scoreboard reading 41 apiece, it was a moment of deja vu for Nalder. The Swans semi-final loss to the Magpies just a few weeks earlier came to mind

"I was like, 'oh my god, not again' after the semi-final, where we basically lost in the last 30 seconds of the game," she said.

"I guess, looking back for me, I was the only playing coach on the court at that time in terms of Kelsey (McCoy) and Mollie (Quin), which has probably been unusual for us.

"The people we had off the court to support us were really important for us at that time, to settle the nerves, regroup, and be able to reiterate the things that we needed to keep doing and the things that we needed to tweak.

"I feel like our bench, both officials and our bench players, really played a massive part in that overtime break heading into our last 10 minutes."

In the hot afternoon September sun, both teams had given their all in the 60 minutes of regular play, and it came down to who could best muster up their energy in overtime.

"It was just never done until it was actually done, and I think that was proven in the fact that we probably had control early in the last quarter and then Boga were able to get back into it to level it at overtime," Nalder said.

"Even overtime was close until the second part of that final five minutes – it really did have it all."

When the final whistle sounded, tears flowed from both the Magpies and the Swans – tears of heartbreak, and tears of joy.

"I even feel like I'm getting a bit teary talking about it now," Nalder said.

"It probably wasn't widely known, but we had some players that had been through some heartaches during our finals series, so we were carrying a lot of emotional attachment to each other.

"To know we had done it for each other and for lots of different reasons, it was really special.

"It didn't really matter how we'd come together for 2023, it all meant a lot to us for a lot of different reasons."

But while there was so much wrapped up in that win, Nalder didn't think it would be productive to take that into the upcoming season.

"To be honest, I sort of feel like, from our perspective, that was last year and that was amazing, but this is a new year," she said.

"We will be a different team, we will be playing against different competition, so what has gone on in previous years, I wouldn't say it's irrelevant, but it's a new year, so we can't dwell on past successes."

Football clubs face

With action coming

from all angles,

THE AFL has released its updated community football concussion guidelines for 2024, with footballers from state to community level to miss three weeks' play following a concussion.

In early March, the league announced they would be adopting recommendations from the Australian Institute of Sport's Concussion and Brain Health Position Statement, in another step to protect players.

The concussion guidelines are reviewed every year, and updated accordingly by the AFL's chief medical officer, the league's medical working group and the AFL's concussion scientific committee.

Speaking last year when the AFL released their 2023 updates, current chief medical officer Dr Michael Makdissi described concussion as "an extremely important issue across our industry"

"The health and wellbeing of all players who choose to play our game, at all levels from grassroots through to the elite game, remains a priority," he said.

This season, grassroots footballers will need to sit out 21 days after sustaining a concussion, nine days longer than their elite AFL counterparts.

The variance is due to the high-level medical resources available to AFL footballers that local footballers do not have.

The AIS statement suggested that players under the age of 19 across all levels should sit out for 21 days, but it was determined that different protocol for different age groups was "impractical".

The AFL's guidelines recommended a four-stage, graded return to play: Stage 1 being "relative rest", stage 2 being recovery, Stage 3 a graded loading program, and finally an unrestricted return to play.

Screen time should be minimised and a player should only complete gentle day-to-day activities for 24 to 48 hours in the first stage before progressing to recovery.

Stage 2's timeline is a bit longer, with players to gradually build from light aerobic exercise to high-intensity aerobic exercise over three days to a week.

The individual should only progress to stage 3 if they have shown a complete recovery from all concussion symptoms and have returned to work or study.

At least one week of non-contact training is the first step of stage 3, before progressing gradually back to full-contact training.

The most common form of head injury in

football, concussion is a part of a spectrum that ranges from repetitive head trauma to severe traumatic brain injury.

Concussion symptoms can be observable or reported, and include but aren't limited to lack of balance, unusual behaviour, headache, blurred vision and nausea.

While it's characterised as a mild brain injury, concussion must be responded to with urgent medical attention, to ensure effects and symptoms do not worsen.

Whether a single concussion, repeat concussion or continued head impacts, head trauma appears to be associated with an increase in the risk of degenerative brain conditions later in life.

It's for that reason the AFL was suggesting a "cautious and considered approach" to the return to play following a concussion.

AFL general counsel Stephen Meade described the upcoming guidelines as "a significant step in the AFL's existing record of ongoing improvements to its concussion management strategy".

"We play a contact sport and there is always going to be risk, however over recent years we have continued to take action to strengthen match-day protocols," he said.

"While there are risks of injury in our sport, we will continue to act to reduce and manage those risks."

The Play AFL website includes a number of resources, available to coaches that teach ways to play the game while protecting your head and the heads of those around you.

The tech world is another avenue the AFL is looking to make the most of, as they suggest the use of the HeadCheck app that allows users to go through a concussion symptom checklist.

The recent guidelines include an assessment and referral form, in which medical or trainer staff can assess the likelihood of concussion.

For community football, medical and training staff are often on the frontline in responding to head knocks and concussion.

Through her role as a football and netball trainer, 26-year-old Swan Hill resident Milly O'pt Hoog has seen first-hand what players risk each weekend.

She described witnessing a head injury during last year's finals as sickening.

"Last year in one of the finals, a kid at the club I'm at attempted an intercept mark and just got taken out in the air," she said.

"Some ladies got footage of the incident,



and in that you could tell that he was out cold when he hit the ground."

The experience was an eye-opening one for O'pt Hoog, who said trainers rushed onto the field to assist the injured player.

"We have to just basically stop the whole

game," she said.

"You run out there and you start working your spinal stuff first, because you just don't even know how severe it is and then we kind of just wait till the player comes to.

"In that incident, you could tell as soon as



he came to, he was barely able to speak, could barely open his eyes, his eyes would just roll back into his head.

"You're running out there as a trainer and you're thinking, 'holy crap, is this guy still alive? Will I be responding to any major trauma?"

O'pt Hoog also wanted people to understand concussion wasn't solely a football

"You don't normally get concussions in netball, but I've seen a girl who got an elbow to the head on the court," she said

"I guess the two different situations were both concussions, but they can present in such different forms."

O'pt Hoog said that more people needed to openly speak about concussion, before more people's lives are impacted.

"I have heard from around other clubs where people have said 'Oh don't say the C word, don't say concussion'.

"As soon as you hear it people are like 'oh maybe he can't play for 12 days' or whatever.

"But we can't have that negligence. We've

be more at risk of mental-health concerns or cognitive issues later in life."

O'pt Hoog would like to see mandatory pre-screening of players at local levels.

"The AFL is recommending that all players, all footballers, go through a pre-screening,

"It can be a little annoying and timeconsuming, but that's what the AFL recommend we should be doing.

"It's difficult for us to know if a player just wants to return to play, and how they are doing without that baseline to go off."

3SH Central Murray Live

WITH the 2024 football season about to get under way, who better to look take an in-depth look at who's in, who's out, and who's the team to beat than the 3SH Central Murray Live commentary team.

Shane Fleming: OK guys, another season is almost upon us. We might as well start with an easy question: who's going to win the Jack Betts this year?

Glenn Stewart: What about Cohuna's new coach Jack Geary, he goes all right, from what I have heard.

Noel Watson: The interesting part when it comes to winning medals, the new players into the league tend to pick up a stack of votes, just because they're new as opposed to just being as good, so I can see where you're coming from with the Cohuna coach. But I think he might have players taking votes off him, so I went the other way and I went with Swan Hill's new coach Michael Herlihy, in a middle-of-the-range ladder position team picking up plenty of three votes.

GS: Often a Jack Betts Medallist will come from a fifth or sixth position team, because they win enough games, they get enough three and two votes to get over the line. The Mallee Eagles will be around that range, so maybe Harry Allen, he's a former winner and often polls well. At United, I rate Joel Walsh, he's a really good footballer and he'd be in my top four or five players in the league.

NW: He's a centre half-back though, not too many centre half-backs poll votes.

Matt Curran: He might move onto a halfback flank this year.

NW: He could nearly play as an onballer.

GS: I agree with you Noel, he'd make a great old fashioned ruck rover, he just controls the game. If they are to go anywhere this year, they need him playing well.

NW: Can he run all day, though?

SF: He'd be a really good burst player in the midfield, I reckon.

MC: Agree.

NW: OK, Shane, who'd you go for?

SF: I think Jydon Neagle. Umpires love him, he gets plenty of the ball, they'll win enough games and he's always a standout,



even with a team full of stars, he's still their standout player.

GS: (Ethan) Gant was great last year, but he's gone now as well so he won't be pinching votes off him. Who do you think will win it, Matt?

MC: I think Jayden Magro for Tyntynder will, Stewy. He's from Darwin, he's a star forward, will kick a heap of goals. He's going to have lots of defenders nervous this year.

SF: And Eagle is back again for Tyntynder, too.

NW: There's going to be a lot of dominant key forwards in the competition this year, isn't there? Nyah have recruited Grenfell, Tyntynder have Magro, the Eagles have Hourigan, even Josh Williams at the Saints is a gun. What about Fuller, is he still playing? SF: Yeah, I believe he is.

NW: Well there's four or five really hard forwards to match up on. Defenders around the league are in trouble. A good key defender could win you the game this year.

SF: What impact does Wade and Moloney leaving Swan Hill have, Noel? It's going to be a totally different-looking Swan Hill, that's for sure

NW: It will be, and the young blokes are going to need to step up a bit because Wade was the one that got them going. Moloney was a bit different because he'd been playing across half-back the last couple of years and making the play, but Wade was the engine room. So that's where some of these younger blokes have to step up. That's why I think they'll finish about fifth or sixth, because they'll win enough games against

the bottom sides to finish somewhere in the midfield. The big slider for me will be Lake Boga.

MC: Unfortunately, they've lost nearly an entire team of senior players across their seniors and reserves.

SF: They have lost 19 guys who played in their seniors last year.

MC: All their recruits, both coaches, all their experienced players have gone, too.

SF: And a lot of local guys as well, so that means a lot of their one-point players have left.

GS: I think they'll miss the finals but I don't think it's all doom and gloom for Boga either, they'll still be pretty competitive because they've picked up a couple of handy players as well. They could surprise, and apparently

It's Kerang's to lose

IT'S almost unanimous – Kerang are the team to beat again.

At least that's the opinion of those in the know, with nine of the 11 Central Murray senior coaches suggesting that the Blues are the team most likely to make the grand final this season.

But while Kerang without question deserve their place at the top of the totem pole, it's expected that they won't get things all their own way, with several challengers set to emerge

After fighting neck and neck throughout last season, Balranald would appear wellplaced to go one step further.

Having gone so close to becoming a Balranald premiership coach – and emulating his father, Merv, in the process

- there's little doubt Jydon Neagle will have his side primed and ready to right the wrongs of last year. Thankfully, they won't have to wait long, with a hostile environment set to await the Blues at Greenham Park next Saturday in an opening-round grand final rematch.

It won't just be Kerang and Balranald who fancy their chances this season. However, with fellow finalists Nyah-Nyah West United and Woorinen also improving their playing lists over the off-season.

The recruitment of Brandyn Grenfell has certainly given the Demons cause for hope and excitement. He's kicked an incredible 264 goals over the past two seasons for Marong in the Loddon Valley league.

It's a similar story at Tigerland, where the

return of Arnold Kirby, Tom Langford, Josh Stone and Clayton McCartney gives the yellow-and-black army dreams of returning to their premiership years.

Speaking of returning past glories, could it be either of the Mallee Eagles or Cohuna Kangas who make the leap into the top five? Or even break their longstanding premiership droughts? Both clubs have recruited heavily under new leadership. Former Golden Square gun midfielder Jack Geary takes over as coach of the Kangas, while Harry Allen and Brent MacLeod will share the role of senior coach at Lalbert.

The other surprise packets could come from old rivals Swan Hill and Tyntynder, two clubs hoping their big-name recruits fire and push them up the ladder.

Having lost Matthew Wade and Xavier Moloney, the Swans have wasted no time finding replacements, with former AFL onballer Jimmy Toumpas joining new coach Michael Herlihy. At the Bulldogs, gun forward Jayden Magro is expected to breath new life, along with the return of favourite son Marcus Wattie

Tooleybuc-Manangatang, Lake Boga and Koondrook-Barham find themselves at different points in each club's development, but don't expect them to be pushovers, with all three clubs set to be competitive providing they keep their best players on the park.

This season really is anyone's to win – and surely shapes as one of the most exciting in recent memory.

AFTER going heartbreakingly close to breaking their 14-year premiership drought just six months ago, the boys from Balranald are back for another tilt at the title – and they are intent on winning it.

Having gone so close last season, there is an air of expectation around the Roos, with a similar playing list rightfully placing them as one of the teams to beat entering the new season.

One of the few players to depart is Ethan Gant, whose run and drive out of the middle will be a big loss, but except for Gant, Balranald will go in with a largely unchanged side.

It's that consistency from year to year that Balranald coach Jydon Neagle hoped would give his side that little bit of a difference, along with their new-found belief that their best football is good enough to match it with anyone.

"There are a lot of boys that were hurting after last year, some of those guys haven't been that deep into a finals series before or in some cases played finals at all, and now they know what it's all about," Neagle said.

"They all believe in themselves a little bit more now that they can do it, and we will do it, if we all commit and work together.

"Another pre-season with just our group and the unity we found after the grand final, I think we'll bond a lot more and that will help us lift our game another 10 or 20 per cent.

"We trust each other now and we know what we're capable of and hopefully we can go all the way.

"We've tweaked a few things, especially defensively, and we've also made some adjustments to the way we move the ball going forward, but that will just be to suit the players that we've brought in.

"We'll play in fairly similar way, but we've certainly made a few adjustments after identifying a couple of things over the summer."

Those players include Renmark forward Lachie Lellman, and onballers Mason Fitzgerald and Bill Parry to help cover the loss of Gant, while Glen Gillbee will also return home when his Bendigo Pioneer duties allow.

Neagle was most excited about the addition of Lellman ahead of his team's round 1 grand-final rematch with Kerang.

"Lachie is a bit of a sharp shooter and a

good finisher, he plays pretty tall for his size and he'll provide us with a good second target up forward," Neagle said.

"Mason (Fitzgerald) will add a bit of depth to our midfield having been a starting midfielder for South Mildura last season and he's going to be a great addition for us as well"

While there has been much speculation about Ben Fuller's return in recent weeks, last year's leading goalkicker looks set to pull on the boots again and anchor what looms as a very potent forward line alongside Drew Lloyd, Lellman and Neagle himself.

The other big change at the Roos this season is at the helm, Neagle this year sharing the coaching duties with the highly regarded Tom Lister.

FROM THE COACH

"I think it's going to be a much tougher competition this year, I don't see there being three or four teams dominating like last season. For us, after the way we performed last year, the aim is to play in the same way again, put our best foot forward but this time go one step further."

WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2024

Having fallen just 10 points short of premiership glory last season, Balranald are widely regarded as the team to beat this year.

The Roos have some of the best top-end talent in the league, such as Ben Fuller, Jordan Wilkins and the Neagle and Lloyd brothers, but if they are to take that next step, they will need to improve their depth. That improvement should come from the likes of Jack Helgeland, Jack Jones, Toby Lay and Rory Fitzgerald, who all showed plenty of positive signs for the future last season.

The addition of Lachie Lellman up forward will help ease the burden on Fuller, but their defence is still a slight concern, apart from Jaxon Neagle, who is an out-and-out star. While the competition should be a lot tougher this season, anything less than a top three finish would be below par for Balranald.

BIG IMPROVER

lan Fuller: Showed glimpses of what he was capable of last year, but the longer the season went, the better and more confident it seemed Fuller was. Will be required to step up after the loss of Ethan Gant, with his speed and ability to break the lines set to be vital to the Roos' chances of reaching another grand final.

THE BURNING QUESTION

Will last year's grand final heartbreak motivate or hamper the Roos?

The old sporting adage that "you need to lose one to win one" may or may not be true - who really knows honestly. While Balranald had every opportunity last year to break their premiership drought, only to fall agonisingly short, this year could prove to be a far harder task. Losing Ethan Gant leaves a big hole in their midfield and opposition teams have had a whole summer to pick apart the Roos' system.

The one unknown is how the playing group responds to the disappointment of grand final day last year. Does it galvanise and motivate them to go one step further? Or does that pain and heartbreak still linger, as it did for Cohuna last season

A NEW coach, combined with the return of several favourite sons, has the Kangas faithful hopeful of a return to finals – and potentially more.

After a bitterly disappointing 2023, where Cohuna went from grand final heartbreak to completely missing the finals, the Kangas have left no stone unturned in their pursuit of that elusive Central Murray premiership.

Jack Geary will take over the reins at the Kangas from Tyson Findlay, who returned to North Bendigo after one season in charge. Geary brings with him an impressive CV, with six premierships at Bendigo Football League powerhouse Golden Square, including last year's six-point win over Sandhurst in which he was adjudged best on ground for the third time in his career in a grand final.

Add to that the 2018 Michelson Medal as the Bendigo Football League's best-and-fairest player, and it's easy to see why the Kangas would feel bullish about their chances this season.

Joining Geary will be Ryan Semmel, a former Victoria Country representative and sixtime club best-and-fairest, mid-sized defender Jayden Cordy and small forward Izaac Johnson. But the real positive is the returns of William Lee, Jackson Williams, Xavier Mitchell, Sam Leitch and Jacob Mitchell, with all five players returning to help their home club climb back up the ladder.

It's a fact that isn't lost on Geary, who despite his impressive resume, is entering his first season as a senior coach, with the Kangas having a clear focus on improving their midfield depth ahead of the new season.

"A lot of the guys we've recruited are local guys who are coming back home and are wanting to try and achieve something for their home club, which is great for the town and great for the club," Geary said.

"We've tried to recruit midfielders that can play all over the ground.

"We feel that we're pretty well stocked for key position players up forward and down back, but with the size of our home ground, we wanted guys who could cover the ground between the arcs and so far, it's looking good."

While the Kangas will go into the season bullish about the chances of playing finals, it hasn't been all smooth sailing this off season, with leading goalkicker Rhys Free departing, along with defenders Jake Hammond, Daniel Paterson and Tom Metherell, with the latter appointed senior coach of Wedderburn.

With so many arrivals and departures, Cohuna will have a vastly different look about them on paper, with Geary also hoping his side will have a different look on the field as well.

"We want try and play a little bit on instinct, but we also need to try and find a balance between that and having a strong defensive structure," Geary said.

"One area we've identified where we need to improve is with our depth and having guys playing their roles, we need all 22 of us playing our roles and having an impact on the game, whether it be big or small.

"I'm coming in with fresh eyes and a new perspective and everyone is starting fresh with me, I haven't got anyone pigeonholed into set positions and it doesn't matter what guys have done in the past, everyone starts again with a clean slate."

FROM THE COACH

"First and foremost we want to improve, but at the same time we want to be right there at the business end of the season. I think the team we've assembled should hopefully stack up against the best, and I suppose after finishing sixth last year, anything higher than that is an improvement, but I think at our best we should be playing finals."

WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2024

The Kangas are once again going all out in an attempt to win that elusive silverware, but this time they've gone down the path of bringing home-grown talent back to the club. Considering the quality of players they've recruited, the Kangas should be aiming for nothing less than a finals appearance, and if they can make use of their outside run as planned, then a top-three finish shouldn't be out of the question either.

Have a dream run with the fixture as well, with NNW United the only finals team from last season they will face twice, with double-up games against Koondrook-Barham, Tooleybuc-Manangatang, Tyntynder, Swan Hill and the Mallee Eagles.

BIG IMPROVER

Dylan Johnstone: Seems unfair to put a player who has been among his team's key contributors in this column, but it's hoped the departure of Rhys Free will have a positive effect of Johnstone's game. Kicked just 19 from 14 matches last season, and although he spent some time in defence, was well down on his 2022 season, when he booted 52 majors. If the Kangas are to push deep into the finals, they will need Johnstone at his absolute best

THE BURNING QUESTION

Who will be the bigger loss - Jake Hammond or Rhys Free? And more importantly, who will replace them? OK, that's two questions, but in the context of the Kangas' line-up they are both big losses. Having led the Kangas' goalkicking for the past three seasons since his return, Free will be difficult to replace. His absence may however free up space for Dylan Johnstone to take over the No.1 forward mantle, and with Daniel Coates, Ryan Semmel and Izaac Johnson rolling through the forward half, the Kangas won't be short on goalkicking options. Hammond on the other hand will be even harder to replace, as there really is nobody who can read the play like him nor take a contested mark. While Will Lee and Sam Leitch will fill the lock down defender role, the Kangas still have work to do on intercepting their opponents' forward

DESPITE losing eight premiership players this off-season, Kerang will still be the team to beat when the 2024 season gets under way next weekend.

With a large turnover of players, it will be a vastly different navy-blue outfit that runs onto Greenham Park next Saturday for their grand final rematch with Balranald, compare to the one that defeated the Roos by 10 points.

The biggest loss will be that of club bestand-fairest Rylee Smith, who has returned to Nullawil. The speedy onballer had established himself as one the Central Murray's premier midfielders over the past two seasons.

Michael Dalrymple, Adam Hunter, Hayden Hall and Michael Runciman have also departed for Newstead, while Troy Davis, Troy Coates, Gregor Knight and Ash Davis all hung up their boots after decorated careers.

While Coates' playing days may be over, he is staying on as senior coach.

The long-time leader was excited by the prospect of seeing the next generation of Kerang footballers get their opportunity at the senior level.

"We've been lucky to have a lot of talent come through our junior pathways over the years, but at the same time they tend to stay at our club because we give them opportunities to play at a young age," Coates said.

"We're mindful of not over-recruiting, there's always a bigger picture at play and while we've been relatively successful in recent years, we're also mindful of the need to back in our kids and it will be no different this year.

"We've lost eight of our grand final side and we've deliberately recruited only four players just so we can blood four of our local, younger players into the team and give them their opportunity.

"It's exciting for the club, and we need these kids to start coming through because we have an ageing list that will probably finish up in the next couple of seasons."

With Kerang's reserves having won last year's flag and their colts team reaching the preliminary final, there is plenty of young talent hungry for their opportunity.

But while the Blues will have a distinct focus on regenerating their list from within, they will also go into the new season as premiership favourites, having recruited well from outside the Central Murray.

Former Golden Square premiership

onballer and 2019 Michelson Medallist Adam Baird will pull on the navy blue this season and is sure to have an immediate impact for his new club, while lively half-forward and wing Brett Kennedy will also wear a Kerang guernsey for the first time.

"So, to replace them with kids that possess genuine speed, I think we'll be even quicker, and with our recruits, they're all running-type players as well."

WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2024

Just like death and taxes, you can be certain that Kerang will always compile a competitive side every season. Widely regarded as being the team to beat, the Blues will kick off their season with a grand final rematch against Balranald in what is sure to be a litmus test for their new look line-up.

After that Kerang's fixture opens up, with the Blues playing just two (Balranald and Woorinen) of last year's top five teams twice, with their biggest challenge likely to be a seven-game stretch without a bye heading into the finals.

While the Blues' midfield will continue to be their biggest strength, they do appear light on for key-position players, especially down back.

Whether opposition teams can win enough of the ball in the midfield to expose their defence will be the challenge.

With a full pre-season under his belt, Nitschke will be like a new recruit. The key forward is set to lead the Blues' front half of the ground.



THE BURNING QUESTION

How do Kerang kick a winning score? I know it's never been a problem in the past, but with Adam Hunter, Michael Dalrymple and Michael Runciman all heading to Newstead and Troy Coates retiring, Kerang will look vastly different up forward this season. Between them, the quartet kicked 70 goals last season, and if you include midfielder

Rylee Smith's 31 goals into that tally, the Blues will need to find another 100 majors from other avenues in 2024.

The return of Jarryd Pertzel will help, with the known goal kicker returning for his second stint at Kerang, as will the return of marking forward Archer Dibsdale. Throw in full seasons from Caleb Nitschke, Brad Pay and Sam Heavyside, and the Blues should have more than enough firepower.

AFTER a winless 2023, the only way is up for the River Raiders, with the club's investment in youth to continue this season under the tutelage of Will Callow.

It's been a patient rebuild for the Koondrook-Barham faithful, and they will need to continue to be patient for a little while longer, with the Raiders facing a tough start to the season, having games against top three teams Kerang, Balranald and NNW United within the first five rounds.

But while last year was one to forget, the positives were certainly starting to show by season's end, with Callow and the Raiders brains trust encouraged by the performances of several young players, particularly Ryan Bassett, Xavier Leonard, Nick Frankling, Nathaniel Leonard and Will Lake.

"We have some good kids coming through," Callow said.

"Unfortunately we've lost Eli Boyd, who's gone to Echuca, but there's definitely some good kids coming through the system and they have the right attitude.

"We're not looking for a flash in the pan, we want to build long-term success and we know it's not going to happen overnight but we're taking steps in the right direction.

"We've got a pretty tough draw, there's no hiding behind that, we play all the top three sides from last year twice and we've got them all in the first month, but the flip side of that is that it's a great challenge for our young group.

"We're going to attack that first month with nothing to lose, we see it as an opportunity to get out there and test ourselves against the best, because we want to improve and that's the only way you can do it, is to play against the best.

"We've topped up with another five or six successful footballers from the Sunraysia area which will certainly help develop those talented kids, but development will still be the main focus for the season."

Nathan Hamence is the one who comes to the Raiders with the greatest pedigree, having won five premierships with Irymple, multiple club best-and-fairests and the McLeod Medal as the Sunraysia league's best and fairest. Hamence should slot straight into Koondrook-Barham's midfield, along with Wentworth pair Cambell Davison and Jordan McKinnon.

Also joining the River Raiders this season will be Nathan and Jason Hura and former

VFL player Billy Driscoll, who won multiple premierships with the North Ballarat Roosters. But perhaps the biggest improvement will come from within, with spring-heeled forward Kye Attwell set to return after missing last season with injury and Callow looking forward to seeing what his new look forward line can produce.

"There's a pretty obvious brand within the Central Murray and most teams play that slingshot footy across half-back and we won't be too much different," Callow said.

"We've got a big ground there that can be hard to defend and we want to try and create a fortress at home for opposition teams to play at and, with that, be a fast, running side.

"Hopefully having Nathan Hura, along with Mitch Christensen and Kye Attwell, should be a pretty dangerous forward line.

"And with Billy Driscoll down there as well, all of the sudden we've got some firepower to hit the scoreboard with.

"We'll be aiming to play fast, free-flowing football and get it into those guys as quickly as we can, then hopefully we can challenge a few clubs"



A MASS exodus of senior players looks set to end the Magpies' two-year finals streak, as the club instead turns to youth under new coach Dean Helmers.

Since suffering a 44-point defeat in last year's elimination final against NNW United, Lake Boga have undergone some serious changes, having up to 19 senior players from last season departing, along with senior coaches Shawn Filo and Angus Monfries.

The exits of Filo and Monfries gave experienced coach Dean Helmers the reins this season to lead his third Central Murray club after stints at the Mallee Eagles and Tooleybuc-Manangatang.

But a shift in leadership won't be the only change as the club heads in a new direction with its playing list.

Helmers was keen to help guide Lake Boga's next generation through the early stages of their senior careers.

"We're most likely going to be the youngest side in the competition this season by a long way, I would imagine," Helmers said.

"The main goal from the club's point of view is that we want to get 40 to 50 games into these kids, some of whom haven't even made their senior debuts yet.

"It's only early days, but having had plenty of discussions around the club, everyone's on the same page, and while you never want to lose too many players year on year, turnover can be a healthy thing.

"The club had a number of non-local players last season and they've had a really strong junior program over the last few years and it's important to give those younger guys an opportunity to transition from colts to seniors."

The club has also looked to entice local talent back, with former juniors Brodie Tonkin, Zac Warne, Aaron Lonergan and Jarrod Taylor returning, and former Swan Hill junior Lachlan Wooding and former North Melbourne VFL player Will Doquille joining.

While all six players will provide Lake Boga with some much-needed cover through the middle and down back, they won't offset the losses of key players Jake Warren, Jacob Simpson, Tyle Williams, Lincoln Sieben, Lochie Laing, Daniel Dzufer, Dustin Burns and Matt Taverna, among others.

Although not expecting to push for premiership glory, Helmers remained bullish about what his side could achieve this season,

especially after a strong pre-season.

"We'll be looking to play a pretty exciting brand, we'll be looking to encourage them to take the game on and move the ball up the ground," Helmers said.

"Their skills are improving rapidly and because the group has had a bit of success over the past few seasons, they want more.

"We want this squad of local kids to play a lot of footy together over the next five or six years and become the backbone of our club's next premiership team.

"A lot of people aren't expecting much from us this year, we've all heard the comments from people outside the club, but we're not worried about what anyone thinks.

"We've been getting up to 30 blokes some nights on the track over the pre-season which is fantastic, so we're definitely heading in the right direction."

"We'll be aiming to play an exciting brand of footy. In a perfect world, hopefully we don't drop away too much, but at the same time, when you have a big turnover of players that can sometimes be the reality. I'd still be expecting us to be competitive at the very least."

THE Mallee Eagles enter this season as the great unknown, with several star recruits and a change in leadership set to catapult them up the ladder.

After finishing last season with just four wins, there is an air of expectation surrounding the Eagles that a far more competitive outfit will take to the field, with the bulk of last year's playing list having re-committed and giving cause for hope.

While Angus McKenzie, Brandon Gardiner and Andrew McDonald won't return, the new recruits far outweigh their departures, with Darcy Hourigan, Jayden Post, Troy Anderson and Jordan Robins all expected to have a major impact on the Central Murray.

Post could also fill that role and has the ability to play at either end of the ground, while Robins and Anderson are expected to add speed and outside run to a team that now has some quality attacking weapons.

The Mallee Eagles recruits won't be the only change, however, with Brent Macleod and Harry Allen taking over the coaching duties from Brent Sheahan. For Allen, to coach his home club is a dream that's about to be realised, but of more importance is his club's desire to climb back into the top five.

"We're bullish and confident with what we can do this year, but we're not getting ahead of ourselves," Allen said.

"We've recruited really well, but more importantly, we've got plenty of young guys that have had massive pre-seasons and then guys coming back from injury such as Toby Sheahan, who'll be like a new recruit for us.

"Honestly, finals is the bare minimum for us I feel, there's a real hunger within our playing group that we want to be playing finals, but then everyone is hoping to achieve the same thing so we really won't know until the season gets under way to see where we fit "

The other positive for the Eagles will be the continued improvement from their local contingent, with Zac O'Meara having won the Eagles' best and fairest last season and Billy O'Meara on track for a breakout year after a strong showing in 2023. Add in Beau Bennett, Darcy McGregor and Brady Fordham and the

Eagles should also have the depth to compete with the better clubs according to Allen.

"We haven't had this level of depth for several years now, so to go into a season with five or six guys who really should be playing senior footy and be likely to miss out on a game is pretty exciting to be honest," Allen said.

"Depth is so important to being successful, especially when injuries happen each year in one form or another.

"The way we've set up our team and our focus across the pre-season has really been around being a good stoppage team, but then we have guys on the outside that can break the lines as well.

"Most teams tend to prioritise one or the other, be it winning the contested ball or outside run, whereas we feel we have a team that can exploit both."

FROM THE COACH

"There's a positive feeling around the club currently, a bit of a revamp of the footy department and I suppose, more importantly, our whole game plan is totally different to what we've been playing over the last few seasons. We've been a bit disappointed with our last two seasons, and I think we'd be a bit disappointed again if we didn't make the top five."

WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2024

It's been a tough couple of seasons for the Eagles, with just eight wins from their last 29 matches, but a muchimproved and highly competitive Mallee outfit is what's expected to run onto the park this season. A change in game plan should also improve performance, with the Eagles' ball movement considered slow and predictable at times last year. We're not likely to know the answer until midway through the season in fairness, but the early signs are certainly positive. The early indications coming from the Eagles after their practice matches are that gelling together shouldn't be an issue, with the recruits, both new and from last year, along with the locals, all on the same page and intent on success. Winning games is the only concern now, and if the men in blue and gold can put some points on the board early in the season, their belief will skyrocket.

But while they were one of the surprise packets last season, that element of surprise is no longer there - opponents are now well aware of the brand of footy the Demons like to


But as with all game plans, Murphy said his club's style would continue to evolve, flagging a more organised defence, while continuing to play with flair in attack.

'We want to move the game forward and keep coming at the opposition," Murphy said.

While the departures of three quality players would ordinarily impact most clubs, the Demons have secured three ready-made replacements, with onballers Jordan and Lucas ludica set to boost the midfield, while the return of key defender Cal Dobbin from a knee injury will help offset the loss of Harrop.

Undoubtedly, NNW United's biggest recruit is dual century-goalkicker Brandyn Grenfell, who will join after back-to-back premierships with Marong, and looks set to provide his new club with the key marking target up forward that they desperately needed last season.

"We're not going to put a ceiling on our season. We obviously finished off pretty well last year and we want to make sure we continue to move forward and hopefully go a few steps further."

KEY PLAYER

Joel Walsh: Won his second club bestand-fairest after returning to the Demons last season. Walsh's form form across half-back was one of the factors in his team's rise to preliminary finalists last season, with his untimely hamstring strain a key reason for NNW United's capitulation to eventual premiers Kerang.

IT will be a very different Swan Hill team that opens the season against Woorinen next Saturday, having lost two of the greatest ever players to pull on maroon and white.

Life without Matthew Wade and Xavier Moloney has been creeping up on the Swans over the past few seasons. It has now become a reality, with both veterans flying the nest.

It won't be just the loss of Wade and Moloney that will hurt this season, with another 10 senior players from last season also deciding to either move onto greener pastures or hang up their boots, including Leighton Dullard, Zach Mihocek and Jared Halligan.

But while losing not just the number and quality of players would be dagger to the heart of most clubs' campaigns, that isn't the case for the Swans, who remain bullish about the season ahead with a fresh voice and several high-quality recruits set to breathe new life into the club.

Michael Herlihy will take over the reins from Cal Beasy for his first coaching stint, with the former South Bendigo and Numurkah midfielder looking to the challenge that awaits him without Wade and Moloney at his disposal.

They're obviously two very different players, 'Xav' (Moloney) is obviously very skilful and 'Wadey' (Wade) is just a competitive beast," Herlihy said.

"Losing their experience is going to hurt us a lot, but we also understand their reasons for going and they don't owe the club anything - they've both been loyal servants and superstars for the club over a long period of time and they leave with everyone's blessing.

"But in terms of who we've recruited, we've recruited a bit more experience to help us fill that void, and I've said to the boys it's just another challenge for us, everyone just steps up now and helps fill that void that's been left.

"It's a new Swan Hill look without them there, but what we can control is how we play football and going forward, we just want to have the best 22 on the park and do the best we can.'

Indeed, the Swans have seemingly filled the experience void left by their former club champions, with former AFL onballer Jimmy Toumpas signing on with the Swans, along with key forward Ned McKeown, defender Anthony Lewin and two-time EG Hunt Medallist Tom Isma. Also joining the Swans this season is former Woorinen winger Nyawi Moore, while

Cooper Angus and Tom Spicer will pull on the Swan Hill guernsey once again.

While the new recruits should hold them in good stead for the year ahead, it's the future talent that had Herlihy excited by what he'd seen throughout a testing and challenging preseason.

"We know we've got really good kids and the fruits of that will come in a few more years,' Herlihy said.

"Even though they are still four or five years away from being really good senior footballers, if we can have them coming through and mix them in with our experienced recruits, it will be a good mix and that's what gets you into finals and beyond.

"We won't be blessed with a lot of height around the ground, so we really want to move the ball quickly and use that to our advantage, yet on the defensive side we want to be a very organised side behind the footy."

FROM THE COACH

"Hopefully a progression on last year, especially after missing the finals by percentage in the end. Every team wants to play finals and we're no exception to that, so hopefully we can progress on last year and push into the top five. Every club picks up players at this time of year and everyone is buoyant about how they're going to go, but footy is a funny game, so you never know."

TOOLEYBUC-Manangatang will be hoping a return to their past is the way forward this season, having former coach Brad Morris back at the helm of his home club.

With just four wins over the past three seasons, the Saints are this year aiming for a change of fortunes under Morris, who led the club to consecutive finals appearances in 2015 and 2016.

It won't just be a new coach that gives Tooleybuc-Manangatang a different look, however, having secured the services of several impactful recruits.

Both Connor Nutting and Elliott Chalmers arrive with impressive resumes. While pleased with the calibre of players recruited, Morris said it was his club's ability to retain the bulk of last year's recruits that had him enthusiastic ahead of their round 1 encounter with the Mallee Eagles.

"Being able to retain six of the eight recruits we secured last year has been a big plus for us," Morris said.

"Not turning those guys over has enabled us to be able to build on last season, and a few of those boys having a few connections has also helped us identify a few of this year's recruits.

"With our recruiting, it was more about getting the right people and the right players as opposed to just getting anyone, which you can fall into the trap of sometimes, especially with a lack of players around our area."

Also pulling on the red, white and black this season will be former players Jackson Morris, Billy Bentley and Zach Prentice, with Morris returning to the club having spent the past few seasons plagued by injury at Tyntynder.

On the other side of the equation, the Saints have lost reigning best-and-fairest Ethan Goldfinch, while veterans Tom Carland, Lachlan Gleeson and Jack Spinks have also moved on.

While the loss of Goldfinch will hurt, the retention of key position players Josh Williams, Jaicob Kenny, Jonathan Marsden, Connor McDonald and John Wardle leaves the Saints well stocked at either end of the ground.

Morris was excited by the prospect of what looms as one of the most potent forward lines in the Central Murray.

"I'm hoping our forward line will be a bit of a strength of ours," he said.

"We've got plenty of talent down there, with guys like Josh Williams, Kai Kearns, Connor Nutting and Jono Marsden, they've all got size and athleticism, so we're hoping that we might be able to stretch some opposition back lines for height and speed.

"We've been working pretty hard on moving the ball by foot and we've done a lot of work on our fitness as well, but we've been really focusing heavily on moving the ball clean and quick by foot so that we can use it efficiently going forward and give those guys every chance of hitting the scoreboard."

FROM THE COACH

"As a club, we've spoken about where we're at and we really need to improve. We've been off the boil for a few years now and the time's right to try and build some foundations back up and get things heading in the right direction. Success helps that, but you have to have the right people around the club and I think from that perspective we are heading in the right direction."

KEY PLAYER

Josh Williams: The former North Melbourne forward had a remarkable first season for Tooleybuc-Manangatang, booting 54 goals from 15 matches and narrowly missing out on winning the Central Murray's leading goalkicker award, despite his team winning just two matches

This should be all the proof needed as to how important Williams is to his team's fortunes this season, especially if the Saints' recruits can provide him with more opportunities to hit the scoreboard. Unstoppable on the lead and clean below his knees, Williams is a nightmare matchup for any opposition defender.

THE BURNING QUESTION

Who plays in the ruck in season 2024? With Hugh Broad set to miss the season with a knee injury, and Angus Crowe also expected to be a late starter, O'Rourke and the Bulldogs' brains trust have a big decision to make. Thankfully, they have plenty of options, but exactly who's best suited to give their midfield the upper hand at stoppages – especially with a big emphasis being placed on winning the

contested ball – will clearly be a big factor in their season.

Elia Ware looms as the most logical first choice, as he tends to play his best footy up around the ball, although if Cameron Cook is fully fit after missing last season with injury, then he too could be a strong option.

Matthew Gillbee is another who can play in the ruck, but with him being such a key component of the Bulldogs' back six, he could be better suited to starting there.

A CHANGE of coach and an influx of talent has the Tyntynder faithful hoping a return to finals football is on the cards.

After breaking an eight-season finals drought in 2022, last season was one to forget for the Bulldogs, with injuries and a drop in form to key players not only knocking them out of the top five, but down to a 4-12 win-loss record.

With Josh Stone returning to Woorinen this season, experienced senior coach Jack O'Rourke has stepped in to fill the void, with the former Tooleybuc-Manangatang and Ultima leader expecting a much-improved performance from the Bulldogs.

"With a bit more structure and a bit more discipline and just with getting everyone working together as a unit, I think we'll see some big improvement," O'Rourke said.

"When we start playing for each other a bit more, the results will follow.

"We've recruited well, but we've lost a few good players as well, but regardless of our ins and outs, the one big positive is that our depth will be a lot better this year, especially with some of the talent that is coming out of the under-18s with kids like Harry Kelly, Wil Hawkins and Cayden Dalton.

"That's probably where most of the excitement is for us to be honest.

"(Jayden) Magro comes with a great wrap and he's going to be really good for us and Marcus Wattie has taken his footy to another level, he's just playing a more complete brand of footy and that's a result of playing at a higher level, but it's our kids that have been the most impressive over the pre-season."

The recruitment of Jayden Magro is undoubtedly a huge fillip for Tyntynder, with the former WAFL and NTFL forward arriving at the club with huge wraps, along with Marcus Wattie, who returns to his home club and will add a touch of class to their midfield that was at times lacking last season.

Also returning to the Dogs are former players Luke Jones, Darcy Woodward, Lachie Carroll and Cameron Cook, who is back after missing last season with injury, with Ned Lay (Balranald), Matthew King (Woorinen) and Lachie Martin (Moulamein) also set to add some much-needed depth to the senior squad.

Also returning is full-forward Jason Eagle, who will be a key part in what looms to be a

potent forward line for Tyntynder, with Magro, Justin Ellis, Matt Corney and Pat Blake, when he isn't on Pioneers duties, all capable of posing a threat both in the air and on the ground.

While the Bulldogs' forward line looks more than capable of kicking a winning score, it's been their midfield where much of the focus has been over the past six months, with O'Rourke looking to a change in game style.

"Contested footy and winning the ball around the stoppages will be a big focus for us this year," O'Rourke said.

"We've done a lot of full contact work over the pre-season and the boys have really improved with their contested ball work.

"Every coach has a slightly different belief and style with who they like the game being played, but I reckon that will be our strength, our ability to get our hands on the ball first and get it going our way."

"We just want to be more competitive as a team and as a club. We just want to improve our behaviour on and off the field and look for improvement that way, and if we get that right we know we'll get results."

AFTER a straight-sets exit from last year's finals series, Woorinen will be hoping redemption comes in the form of former club champions.

Returning to the Tigers' den this season are former players Arnold Kirby, Josh Stone, Tom Langford and Clayton McCartney, a quartet not only bringing class and depth to some key deficiencies of Woorinen's last year, but also plenty of experience to a relatively young squad.

For Tigers coach Marcus Demaria, who will return for his 10th season in charge, it's that extra layer of experience he hoped could change his team's fortunes at the business end of the competition.

"Even though we've had some key departures, with the players that we've brought in and with a 10 to 15 per cent improvement from the rest of the squad, we feel like we're in a pretty good position to compete again," Demaria said.

Tom Langford, for example, will be a huge plus for us. He won't be the same player that he was when he was last here, because he's a little bit older now, but he'll make us a three or four-goal better side without even touching the footy, just with his leadership and guidance and everything he does off the ball."

The other big recruit, both figuratively and physically, is Arnold Kirby, the Tigers ruckman returning after plying his trade with Sebastopol last season and with the Waratahs in the NTFL this summer.

With Kirby expected to take over the ruck duties, his return will release Lachie Gardner to play forward, according to Demaria, and help fill a gaping hole in the line-up that was one of the key factors in a poor finals showing last year.

"One thing we lacked all last year was having that key target up forward," Demaria

"Come finals time, we actually looked for a makeshift ruckman instead of a forward, which ended up being Ben Hunt, just so we could release Lachie (Gardner) forward.

"Now with Arnie (Kirby) back, that enables us to have at least one of the them down there permanently.

"Our forward line will be a lot more potent as a result, with Will Collicoat, Clayton McCartney and Josh Stone down there as well.

"They can all present and take a mark, as

well as cover the ground, which is what we want because we'll probably change the way we play and the way our forward set up is with the players coming further up the ground."

While their new recruits should have the

Tiger faithful bullish about the season ahead,

they have also suffered some key departures, with veteran midfielder Robbie Miller returning to Laharum, defender Angus Butterfield going across to Birchip-Watchem, and Danko Bzenic, Tom Isma and Bailey Fry also seeking fresh The one that could hurt the most is Dylan

Godwin, the classy onballer who finished sixth in Woorinen's best and fairest last season, although Demaria was confident his midfield was well placed to attack the season head on.

'We'll have plenty of depth in the midfield with guys like Jye (Barry), 'Doey' (Josh Domaille), 'Warby' (Lachlan Warburton), Tom Langford, Josh Stone and Mitch Uhlhorn running through there," Demaria said.

One area we needed to beef up was our midfield and I think we've achieved that - the boys have put in a lot of work throughout pre-season and I think we'll see plenty of improvement."

"We want to get ourselves to a grand final ultimately, that's always the aim as it is for every team. Our intentions are to always make the grand final and win the flag, whether we do or not that's a different story, but I think at our best we are certainly capable of achieving that goal."

WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2024

Despite losing several players over the off-season, Woorinen should once again be aiming for finals, having also recruited well. How do Woorinen best manage the Arnold Kirby-Lachie Gardner ruck combination? I don't think it's a coincidence that after


playing the majority of last season in the ruck, Lachie Gardner returned to his best form, finishing third in the Tigers' best and

Wooden-spooners Koondrook-Barham may struggle to lift themselves from the bottom of the ladder, having trouble recruiting and losing some of their key players.


Balranald look to be in a good position to stay up the top of the competition, with Elli-

COMING up just short of finals last year, Kerang are hoping they can go one step further.

The Blues had a strong line-up that really seemed to find their stride last season, but finished in sixth place, just missing out on a finals spot.

While coach Chloe Adams was pleased overall with how her team performed, she said there was "lots of learning" they will take with them into the new season.

Adams said that this year the Blues were taking on more of a squad mentality in their senior grades, hoping to give both the players an opportunity to prove themselves and the club the best chance of success.

"We're giving people the opportunity throughout the year as well, rewarding effort and changing things up if something's not working or just being a little bit more fluid with our teams, so that they are not set in stone too early," she said.







"I think it will give me a new challenge being off the court, and I think it is probably about time that I have new challenge in that regard of stepping up and coaching and being able to spread my time a bit more, especially with overseeing some other grades, as normally you just don't get that opportunity while playing."

Filling in those gaps in the team will be 15-year-old pocket rocket Ava Crow, who became an integral part of the Tigers midcourt last season. Bennett will also look to Tiger cubs Willow Conlan, Eva Boulton and Olivia

Free during the season.

The young players will be aided by the experience and expertise of club legend Tessa Demaria in the defence end, as well as Jaimee Beasy through the midcourt.

The club will also welcome back Nikki Trenfield.

"We're going with the term of one wise head in each third." Bennett said.

"I think it's time that we give these kids a red hot crack at it, because they are our future now, so let's start encouraging them and quiding them now.

"There is so much knowledge sitting on the sideline for once.

"For myself, it is hard to tell Willow or Ava what to do when I'm on the court with them, so being able to sit on the sideline and give more guidance and reassurance, I feel like they will come a lot further that way."

SEVEN months after breaking their 28-year premiership drought, there is only one question on the minds on Hay's supporters: Can the Lions go back-to-back?

A 29-point victory against last season's ladder-toppers Ultima was the culmination of Hay making it through the gauntlet of a tough finals campaign, after finishing the season in third place.

Premiership coach Mick Cattanach said the dreaded premiership hangover was something that was hard to ignore coming into the season.

THE addition of powerful key-position players was a strong focus at Macorna over the off-season, who already have the capacity to win the hard ball but lacked direction.







FIFTH is the hot spot on the Loddon Valley football league ladder this year - everyone who finished south of it in 2023 has made that the benchmark of success.

It's where Bridgewater did finish, and although it has had a very serious crack at bolstering its ranks in the off-season, it is still facing something of an uphill challenge.

The top four sides have been going flat out stacking their ranks with some genuine talent, some as replacements but most are new blood, and quality players who will raise the stakes for everyone when the season begins.

And that's the dilemma facing co-coach Rick Ladson.

He has had his own recruiting coups, including marquee names such as Strathfieldsaye's Lachlan Sharp and the returns from Sandhurst of Lee Coghlan and

Big news in the league, especially when you toss in three more from Strathfieldsaye: Harry Conway, Jack Neylon and Joe Mayes.

Last season, Sharp kicked 98 goals, including a season-high 14 against Kangaroo Flat in August.

No question, Ladson has done just about everything he can to get his side ready for the

"The youth we have coming through is really promising and we're really excited about what lies ahead," he said.

"It's always exciting when you have an offseason line we did.

"Bringing in the experience we have to the footy club has been fantastic. The training sessions have been intense and there's a buzz around the club.

"The boys are really keen to do well and



push each other. The commitment of the group has been really pleasing.

'While we've recruited well, at the end of the day we're still 20 goals behind the best side (Marong), so there's plenty of work to do."

By those calculations, it also puts them 18 goals behind Pyramid Hill, last season's runner-up, which has also been doing some recruiting of its own in its bid to catch Marong But Ladson wasn't fazed.

ANTHONY Dennis has one experience he is desperate to share with the rest of his Calivil United team – winning a flag.

In his first stint as coach - from 2016 to 2018 – he took the Demons to the 2017 premiership and he is just as keen to get there again himself.

And if his off-season recruiting is anything to go by, he would be planning for finals as the starting point this season.

"We have added around 10 players to the list and that depth has been reflected in the quality of our pre-season, which has been excellent, with a regular 25 every night - and we hit 30 the other day," Dennis said.

"This is my second year back and we all know what we want out of this year and everyone has been working hard to get there.

"Even I reckon I will be playing at my lightest in more than 10 years - I have had to do that to lead by example, you can't ask the boys to do it if you won't."

Dennis came home - his family still farms in the district – after time away at Tongala, which was closer to where he had been living, and was planning to play out his career as a Demon.

"I am delighted we only lost a few players after 2023 because the turnover here since COVID has been ridiculous," he said.

"But right now, in fitness and attitude, we are well ahead of where we were last year, and that's a big positive for us.

"Also, if you analyse our 2023 season, while we only won three games, we also only lost another six to eight by four goals or less, as we didn't bat all that deeply, but we have got a bit more grunt in the line-up for 2024.

But Dennis conceded last year's top four had "really loaded up" for the new season, so



grabbing that fifth and final slot was what he saw as a realistic target right now.

Once you get there, finals tend to be a different ballgame in which anything can happen - and does.

"With me and assistant coach Sam Maher both playing, we will be relying heavily on Ross Maxted to run things from the bench, and as a former player and premiership coach we couldn't be in better hands on game day," he said.



The resurgence of his team has been reflected by the club's strong pre-season and Payne's push for more structure on and off the field


He said they regularly had 30-plus players at training, a serious step up from his first year at the club, when there were nights in the single digits.

With Payne on the field, that also means

assistant coaches Nathan Angelino and Shaun Morgan will play key roles running game days.

At the same time Payne will return to the back line this year – where he has played most of his football – after being slotted in as a mid-forward in his first year with the Blues.

"It will also let me see the whole field during the game, so that with the key pointers and feedback from Shaun and Nathan at the breaks, I'll have a good grasp of where we are going," he said.

NEWBRIDGE co-coaches Sam Gale and Daniel Smith are looking forward to their second season in charge of the Maroons because in many ways it will be more like a first for them.

Joining the club only in December 2022, the pair inherited a playing list all but locked in, a pre-season under way and a culture established.

Their side would finish the year at 4-12 – but that was last year.

Now the coaches have their eyes set on finals footy and recruitment has been the first big step.

Gale said that even though they lost Dylan Stevens (to Campbell Creek) and Matt Geary (returned home to Queensland) he believed the core group, plus five key new players, made Newbridge a 10 to 12-goal better side.

"We are being realistic about this, looking around and hearing the talk, you know everybody has lifted their roster and it is going to be a pretty tough season," Gale said.

"But we reckon fifth spot is wide open in 2024 and that's going to be our target – if we do any better we'll take that as well.

"Our pre-season has been solid, with no fewer than 20 at every training and perhaps one of the real plusses this year is our club depth – the reserves are looking very strong as well and that will put pressure on for spots in the seniors and everyone will have to lift to stay in the side."

Gale said a cornerstone of the club's finals' campaign was centred on some of the new faces in the line-up, such as Andrew Padbury, a forward with an impressive resume including VAFA, and brothers Jono and Ed Aujard, who also both played Amateurs.



Jono Aujard is a midfielder who has played TAC Cup and Ed Aujard fits anywhere between the half-back and half-forward line.

They are joined by new playing assistant coach Tyler Constable, coming from Harcourt in the Ballarat league, someone Gale rated highly, considering him to have "star

potential".

"We reckon we have a good game plan and having run the full pre-season and had that first year, the players have got used to us and have really bored down into the program and we are very positive about the season and can't wait to get it started."

FROM THE COACHES

"We have used our first year for us and the players to get familiar with each other and what we expect and everyone at the club has responded well to that. We have recruited players we feel will help ignite us on the field, and we have a good mix of youth and experience and there is plenty for everyone at Newbridge to be excited about."

IT should mark a big year, but losing grand finalist is perhaps the most hated label in football.

And coach Nathan Fitzpatrick knows there is going to have to be some real bite in the Bulldogs to get them back to that one day in September this year.

Pyramid Hill is one of those rare clubs that does nearly all its pre-season in another town, but the geographic spread of its playing roster makes Bendigo home until the real action begins.

Fitzpatrick, a Bendigo boy himself, was lured by good mate Zach Alford to the Hill as an under-18 in 2013 and he has been there ever since - and now enters his third year as coach.

Considering his club has not won a flag since 1950, the 16-point loss to Marong was a particularly bitter pill for players and supporters to swallow.

"On the upside, that game has left the boys pretty motivated and with more than half the squad made up of locals or longterm players, they are pretty hungry to get back there and turn it around," Fitzpatrick

"We were so close, so we haven't had to tinker with too much in our game plan, and we have added a swag of new, and familiar, faces to the squad in the off-season and only lost three from our grand-final side.

"Now we have a really good spread of experience and youth, with ages ranging from 20 to 35 and most players in the 20 to 30 bracket, and we are planning to be back there in September to end the drought.

While Fitzpatrick's career ended with a knee a few years ago, he managed to convince Alford to return this year and said he represented the "good players and good people we want at Pyramid Hill".



"When you look at how far and wide we are spread, it is obvious people are here because they want to be, not just for a pay packet," he said.

Now the season is almost here, trainings are being split between Bendigo and

Pyramid Hill and the momentum is peaking at the right time.

Fitzpatrick, who left Golden Square in Bendigo to make Pyramid Hill his football home, is hoping 2024 will prove to be the club's golden year.

FROM THE COACH

"The people who have joined us are genuinely invested in Pyramid Hill and have increased the team's depth and bring success with them. With around 30 looking for a game I'm not looking forward to that first selection night. But we are hungry, there will be competition for places, which is always a bonus for any coaching team and hopefully we can consign 1950 - and the memory of 2023 - to the history books."

Zach Alford: While he is coming back from injuries he is a player Fitzpatrick describes as "the barometer" because he will be the club's driver of intensity on and off the field. Pioneers build on

A WHIRLWIND 2023 season for the Bendigo Pioneers culminated in one of their young footballers being selected with the No.1 pick in the AFL draft.

While much of the national football media's focus was on 18-year-old Tongala star Harley Reid, it was just another football season for the Pioneers.

Pioneers coach Danny O'Bree said the media attention was more about preparing Reid for AFL football.

"I guess from the Pioneers' point of view, we were probably a bit more under the microscope with how the program would continue to develop a top prospect,"

"Obviously Harley was touted pretty highly, but we've also seen a fair few players who fall off that perch pretty quickly,

"He probably gets even more attention now, everyone kind of wants a piece of him, which has got to be a bit challenging in itself and weigh a person down.

"It's something you have to learn pretty quickly, and it is probably more about teaching him those strategies.

"We aren't the ones who have to deal with the messages, the phone calls or

"That media attention is absolutely a distraction for every person around the program or the club, and we know that West Coast are sort of dealing with that this

"For him to show that resilience and work through it and stay at the top of his game, it's very impressive."

O'Bree said that Reid's resilient and personable nature was a credit to the young footballer and his family.

"Harley is quite a resilient kid," he said. "No one has really gone through that scrutiny here before and I'm not sure if they ever will again.

"Anything Harley did or said was analysed, so it's a huge credit to his family to maintain that grounded nature that he had, and the genuine human that he is.

To keep developing Harley in a positive way, and to ensure that he was the No.1 pick, I'm very proud of our program.

Reid and his Pioneers teammates travelled to their coach's hometown Nyah last year, and O'Bree was stoked to show the young players where he was from.

"We definitely try our best to get up into our regional places," he said.

"It's pretty amazing that we can showcase our town to these kids, to show them where we are from and the reasons why we do what we do.

"Obviously, Harley was a pretty big drawcard last year, a few people sort of came from everywhere to come and have a look at the way we go about our training.

"We rely so heavily on on our regional coaches and our regional connections, and relationships we have with teams and clubs in the region.'

O'Bree hoped the opportunity to show the young players what the game of football means to the people across the region would encourage them to strive for more.

"Football is just the heart and soul of the community," he said.

"Particularly in our region, footy clubs and netball clubs, and the people within them, are so important.

Girls coach Whitney Kennedy said getting three players drafted was fantastic for the program and for the players.

"It was actually really rewarding, because we had a bit of a challenging season last year.



Umpires are a tight-knit club

THEY'RE an important component of a simple equation when it comes to local sporting achievements: without umpires, none of it can happen.

The men and women who run out each weekend to officiate their chosen sport do it for a range of reasons, but recognition is often far down the list.

For Central Rivers umpires manager Brent Howden, the decision was made for him two decades ago

"When I first started here, I didn't want to umpire football," he said.

"I just wanted to come down here and have a run around at training of an evening.

"It's a great way to get your fitness up, it's a worthwhile thing to try out if you're just interested in that side of things.

"But it basically got to a point where they were a little short and they asked if I'd be able to take on a game.

"I took it on with no dramas, and now, 20

years later, I'm still here doing it."

Howden said much had changed, including the strong social nature of the umpiring group.

"We are just like a footy club here," he

"The key differences being that we're a little bit of a smaller group, and that we obviously don't play football.

"We have 55 registered umpires, but we are looking to hopefully bring in a few more," he said.

"We still do social events and catch up outside of football. Throughout the off-season, we try to get together and do a few things as

"It's not like three umpires just walk out there on a Saturday morning and plan to umpire however they'd like.

"It's the sort of thing where you have to have a lot of trust in the people around you. We've all got to be on the same page.

Umpires can earn between \$1000 and \$3600 for their efforts throughout a Central Murray or Golden Rivers season.

Howden said he and his fellow umpire coaches oversaw the selection process before each Saturday and tried to keep everyone

"We need roughly 25 to 30 central umpires each week," he said.

"To cover the eight games that we oversee, we need a total of 24 umpires.

"We've got guys from all across the region, spanning from Cohuna to Barham, Kerang, Murrabit – just everywhere we possibly can.

We try to keep those umpires as local as we can, but there will have to be times that we have to make a tough decision.

"It doesn't always work, but when it does, it keeps everyone pretty happy."

The AFL's commitment to ensuring umpires are free from abuse at all levels, has translated to more respect for local umpires.

Howden said those hesitant to join would soon find they had the confidence to do the

"We're a very welcoming place for people to join in, we just want to help people out on their umpiring journeys," he said.

"Sometimes us umpires need a hand too, it's not just the people on the sidelines or the trainers and physios, we want to enjoy what we do as well.

"A lot of people always say that they'd never umpire, not even for a million quid, but it's really not that bad.

The more people that we get joining up, the more people will realise they have the ability to help out.

"They might see little Johnny running out to umpire on the weekend and think, 'gee, if Johnny can do it, then so can I'.'

FLEMO'S TOP 50

1. Jydon Neagle (Balranald)

Was ranked No.1 last pre-season, and only enhanced his reputation across 2023. Will be desperate to lead the Roos to a premiership, and will need to be at his very best to do so.

2. Josh Nitschke (Kerang)

Is the prototypical modern midfielder with elite running capabilities and sublime foot skills. Is already the best player in the Central Murray's best team despite his young age.

3. Adam Baird (Kerang)

The first of the new faces to make this year's top 50, Baird comes to the Blues with an impressive resume that includes a Michelson Medal as the Bendigo league's best and fairest, along with multiple premierships and club best-and-fairests.

4. Joel Helman (Cohuna Kangas)

10. Nick Lang (Kerang)

Will go into this season as the competition's premier ruckman in my opinion, and provided he stays injury free, will show the Central Murray why he's rated so highly by season's end.



11. Josh Williams (Tooleybuc-Manangatang)

Was the Central Murray's leading goalkicker all season until round 18. Dominated up forward in a team that gave him very little opportunity to flourish and it will be good to see what he can do in a more competitive side this year.

12. Arnold Kirby (Woorinen)

Returns to Woorinen after a year in the Ballarat league with Sebastopol. Kirby being back will make a massive difference to Woorinen's line-up.

13. Joel Walsh (NNW United)

Won his second Pat Phelan Medal (NNW United best-and-fairest) last season and was a big reason in their climb up the ladder with his attacking play off half-back.

14. Matthew Neagle (Balranald)

Like his brother Jaxon, Matthew was a big reason in Balranald's rise up the ladder last season. Dangerous midfielder who finds plenty of the ball and uses it well.

15. Darcy Hourigan (Mallee Eagles)

Another new recruit to the Central Murray, Hourigan arrives at the Eagles after leading Nairne Bremer in the Adelaide Hills league to their first premiership last season, with the key forward kicking 115 goals for the season.

16. Sean Hunter (Kerang)

Kerang young gun who took his game to a new level last season. His run and carry off half-back and hunger to take the game on makes him a player to watch.

17. Zac O'Meara (Mallee Eagles)

Won his first senior best-and-fairest last season and has found his place across half back for the Mallee Eagles. Looks set to explode in a more competitive Eagles outfit in 2024.

18. Brandyn Grenfell (NNW United)

Will be the key marking target the Demons have been crying out for up forward. Another player who comes into the Central Murray with massive wraps, having kicked 110 and 154 goals over the past two seasons for Marong.

19. Bradlee Pay (Kerang)

Kerang veteran who found a new lease on life with a move forward late last season. Dominated the preliminary final against NNW United, kicking four first-quarter goals to send the Blues through to the decider.

20. Marcus Wattie (Tyntynder)

After spending last season with Shepparton United, Marcus Wattie will return to his home club this season. Is one of the most dynamic midfielders in the league at his best and will give the Bulldogs some muchneeded pace out of the middle.

21. Brodie Tonkin (Lake Boga)

Like Wattie, Tonkin will return to his home club and have an immediate impact on his club's midfield after playing high-level football, including stints in the VFL, TAC Cup and VAFA in recent seasons.

22. Lachlan Ross (Kerang)


One of the first picked in the dominant Kerang team, Ross is expected to play as more of a lockdown key defender this year.

The Balranald ruckman will return for





Woorinen women stand tall in finals

WOORINEN'S trailblazing focus on growing football opportunities for girls and women in the region led the club's women to a second-place finish last season.

In their first year playing football in the Central Victoria Football League's Women's competition, Woorinen lost just three games on their way to the finals.

It was a whirlwind season for the Tigers, who made it through to the competition's grand final the hard way after losing their first final to Castlemaine.

But following an eight-point win over Eaglehawk in the preliminary final, the Tigers met Castlemaine again and took the game right up to the eventual premiers.

The Woorinen women lost to the Blues by 17 points, but their luck may have swung the other way if their goalkicking had been more accurate.

The Tigers had a one-point lead at the first break, and really had Castlemaine on the ropes in the first half with more scoring shots.

But it took the Tigers until the fourth

quarter to score a goal, and by that time the Blues had already piled on five of their own.

Coach Katelyn Hazlett said her side could walk away from the loss with their heads held high.

"I was really proud of our efforts on that night," she said.

"That was the best we'd done against Castlemaine all year, and throughout most of the game, we really controlled the play and had a lot of the possession.

"Unfortunately, we just couldn't get the ball through the big sticks."

But the loss didn't put too much of a dampener on the occasion, as Hazlett expressed how special the game was.

"It was a pretty special occasion, and it's really a huge testament to our team.

"This team got put together pretty quickly, so I think it was a pretty surreal experience.

"But now that we've had a bit of time to sit back and reflect, I think that we can all understand a bit more how special it all was."

Hazlett said she couldn't have dreamed of playing in an all-female grand final before joining Woorinen.

"Growing up, I thought that football was just for the boys," she said.

"I started playing maybe nine years ago, in the second year of Woorinen's youth girls.

"Back then that was all that we had, we would go down to Bendigo practically every

"We would be lucky to get maybe one or two home games. Now we have a full pathway for our girls right from under-12s, to

youth girls, now a women's team where they can train at home and play nine home games.

"It's crazy to think that we can do this now, when this wouldn't have been an option only a few years ago."

It wasn't just Woorinen's women that made their way to a grand final, as their youth girls team took on White Hills in the Bendigo Junior Football League's decider last September.

The girls were unlucky in their loss, having fought back from a slow start to take the game up to White Hills.

Having taken over the youth girls coaching position from Jason Murphy for this season, James Downing said it was important for the youth girls to see the pathway forward.

"This year we've had six or seven girls

move onto our women's program," he said.
"It is a great pathway for girls and women
to have in Swan Hill.

"Moving forward, we're really looking to bring that next wave of footballers into our youth team

"I'd encourage any girls to come out and give it a shot. They can come out, pick up a footy and have a kick around.

"Even if they're just in it for training, they will get a great understanding of the game and the skills and will be shown the clear pathway that girls footy now has."

It's that pathway forward that has coaches excited at both women's and girls level, as Downing said.

"It doesn't matter if they're talking about the men's program, the women's program or the girls' program," he said.

"Woorinen is the one club and that is

shown through the support that we all get.

"We want them to be able to achieve their football goals, whether that is playing AFLW, VFLW or coming back and playing community footy, they need these pathways to be able to get there."

Hazlett echoed Downing's sentiment, and was excited by the prospect of Woorinen's female programs continuing to grow.

"I feel pretty lucky to have this opportunity, especially getting to work alongside the youth side," she said.

"Just knowing that they have the opportunity to take football as far as they wish to, and that they have the pathways to go all the way through.

"Hopefully one day we will be able to say that we've had our little youth girls, come all the way through our program and possibly even go further."
