





north for the winter.

But the dream of winning that elusive flag drew him back, with a fit and healthy body finally giving the former coach the chance to realise that dream.

"To be honest, you probably wonder if it's ever going to happen, if you'll every actually win one," Daniels said recently.

"You sort of build for a few years and think we're going to improve, we're going to improve and eventually we did, but even now almost six months later, it's still a bit surreal.

"To think that we're reigning premiers is a bit of a weird thought, but it's obviously a really good thing we've been able to accomplish and something that in years to come, I'm certain that we're going to look back on very fondly.

"I haven't reflected a hell of a lot on it, to be honest, we really enjoyed the celebrations and everything that came with it but I think it will be something I will look back on when I'm finished and be really content with.

"It was a really special day for the club, and seeing so many people from the community out there and celebrating, especially the 30 minutes straight after siren, seeing so many people out there and seeing different people emotional was something I'll always remember.

"Even having my whole family there, we've all played our footy out at Nyah, like Brent was there, mum and dad and then playing in it with Riley (his brother).

"It meant a lot to a lot of people and just seeing the joy on their faces and then later that night back at the clubrooms, it was really special."

As is the way, the world keeps turning and so it has for both Nyah Nyah West United and Lake Boga, who now face very different challenges ahead of a new season.

Although they will both be reigning premiers - they have also taken very different paths over the past six months.

For Lake Boga, that day in September would prove to be the last game that very special group would spend together, with all seven of the Magpies starting team departing the club over the off-season, replaced by the next generation of Magpies who no longer need to dream - but believe that victory is

development of its junior players.

After all, a club's purpose is far beyond turning up on Saturday to kick a funny shaped ball around an oval.

While country football and netball clubs have been the breeding ground for many elite football careers, moreover they are a connection point for communities.

Clubs rely on the hard work of their volunteers to ensure success, and ongoing success requires juniors coming through the

As town populations decrease, so does the future playing pool for clubs to draw from. Focusing in on the Golden Rivers league. the question has become, is the league

With just six teams remaining, Ultima made the decision to apply for a transfer to CMFNL last vear.

While their request was denied, the club has indicated they will likely apply again this

Having given the five remaining clubs an additional year to weigh up their options moving forward, it is a possibility that Golden Rivers league will not continue beyond the 2025 season.

While the book may close on the Golden Rivers league if other clubs decide to follow Ultima's suit, it is important to remember the move to a new league will be a new chapter for clubs.

At this stage, it appears all remaining clubs have viable options to secure their future.

If Ultima is granted their application, they will move into the CMFNL with little effect on their playing unit as a large percentage of their side, both juniors and seniors across football and netball, reside in and around Swan Hill.

Hay committee member Mick Cattanach said the Lions were considering their options in preparation of a league change.

"Hay is a very sound club with solid numbers, strong support from the community and success on the field," he said.

'We have the junior numbers to move forward and the decision we will face if the league folds is where we want to go.

"Due to our location, Hay has always had to travel and that doesn't really bother us, but we will be mindful of our families as additional travel can be a burden.

"Whatever happens at the end of this year, Hay will remain an independent club and will make the best decision for our members."

Hay senior co-coach James Moran said the club had a committee of people exploring the best options for the club.

"If Ultima leave the league and the decision is made for Golden Rivers to fold, we'll be ready to make the change to a new league," he said.

"I think the most important thing is the survival of clubs because the club is often the heartbeat of small country towns.

Wandella president Leigh Hollingworth had a similar opinion.

"We'd be remiss if we weren't thinking about our options moving forward, it is a very real possibility that we will have to select a new league," he said.

"We are a strong club who has had success in retaining players and have good junior numbers.

"There are multiple league options for us to consider including, Heathcote, Loddon Valley, North Central and possibly CMFNL.

"A decision will be made with families at the forefront, but we certainly will remain a stand-alone club, merging is not in our foreseeable future."

Moulamein has its eyes firmly set on the season ahead and despite coach Brodie Tonkin being aware of possible changes, he said it won't be the main focus.

"Everyone is talking about what will happen but we're not getting carried away with what the end of year will bring," he said.

"Country football is an ever-changing landscape and we'll just be focused on each week of football."

Macorna coach Paul Longstaff shared a similar sentiment saying that whatever happens to the league moving forward, Macorna would remain a strong club.

AN example of the complex family tree of country football clubs is the Appin **Grasshoppers and Kerang Football** Club.

- Appin was established in 1910 in the Leaghur Football Football Association and joined the Kerang and District League (now Golden Rivers) in 1945.
- They won two premierships (1964 and 1987).
- · Kerang originally had two sides playing in the Northern and Echuca Football League, Kerang and Kerang Rovers.
- These two sides amalgamated in 1991 with the resultant club retaining Kerang Rovers' name and navy blue and white
- Appin then merged with Kerang Rovers to form Kerang Rovers-Appin in 1996.
- In 2000, the club changed its name to Kerang Blues and now competes in the Central Murray Football Netball League (CMFNL).

That's a sample of a quite straight forward evolution of three clubs, others are much more complex.

but I think it will be tight at the top between them, Cohuna, NNW United and maybe even Woorinen, who could surprise. I have tipped the Eagles to win it though so I should say yes.

Is it time for Kerang to rebuild?

Noel Watson - Kerang are on a rebuild, absolutely it's time for a rebuild and in many ways, I think they've got the right coach for that. I think a lot of the young blokes will understand what the new coach is saying and I think he could be the right coach for the right time.

Glenn Stewart - Definitely. They've been the dominant force in the competition for well over a decade now, but it might just be time to start again. All those life memberships they gave out at the end of the year were well deserved, not only from the players but for the committee as well, but Grayling is definitely the type of coach to rebuild

Matt Curran - After winning nine of the last 12 premierships, they can probably sit back and enjoy that for a little while I think. They've had a nucleus of players that have kept them together for 15 years and they've done so well with that, but ultimately, change will happen and it may be time for rejuvenation of their list. They have plenty of good young players coming through and a lot of locals, but it may be two or three years of a rebuild for them to take on their next finals' challenge.

Shane Fleming - Think their hand is forced now to be honest, regardless of whether it's time or not. They've got a very good coach in, which is a positive, and I think he'll be excellent to help develop that next generation, but he's still got very

How big of an impact will Marcus Demaria have on the Raiders?

Noel Watson - It's interesting, I don't think they will know how much influence he has until about two years time, when they fully grasp what he brings to the table, because it's going to be a steep learning curve. It may take them a little bit of pain and suffering from their supporters to actually understand it, but again, I think that he also is probably the right coach for the right time.

Glenn Stewart - He'll reshape their game, they've recruited really well and he's already been heavily involved in recruiting, not only quality players, but also some junior players from Kerang. He's an experienced coach, he's coached in four grand finals, won two, and that's just in the Central Murray and doesn't include the ones over at Horsham. He'll have a significant impact on Koondrook-Barham and already you can see the wheel turning. They have a long way to come from being on the bottom, but by the same token,



they've recruited well and have kept most of their local players.

Matt Curran - He'll bring to them a style that maybe they haven't had before, they'll have structure in their game plan. It's just whether they have enough good recruits to implement their game plan this year, but certainly they'll be much improved on what they have been over the last


Shane Fleming - Marcus will have a massive impact and you could argue he already has. There is a real buzz around the Raiders this season which is something that has been missing for

Can anybody compete with the Cohuna Kangas midfield of Joel Helman, Tom Toma, Ricky Monti, Jack Geary and Jackson Williams?

Noel Watson - I think that's the big winner for the Cohuna Kangas and that's why I've tipped them for the flag. Good midfields in country footy get their opportunity to go forward and consistently go forward. It's just going to be a lot of forward footy for them and it'll take its toll across the season, I think they'll score enough goals to see them into the finals and then go ahead and win it on the big stage and on the big ground.

Glenn Stewart - I think if the Mallee Eagles are going to be a real threat then they have to. They have Allen, Macleod, Darcy McGregor, they are maybe not collectively as strong, but they aren't far

Matt Curran - I don't mind both Tooleybuc-Manangatang's and the Mallee Eagles when you



look at the midfields that they run through there as well too. What will be the challenge for all those sides will be can they kick enough goals in the midfield and alternatively can they starve their opposition of kicking goals for them to win the flag.

Shane Fleming - Not sure anybody can match Cohuna's midfield, but the Eagles may be a bit stronger up both ends and that might be enough to beat them when it matters.

What's going to be the season's biggest story?

Noel Watson - I think the season's biggest story is going to be depth, slash lack for everybody, which is becoming a real problem. The second biggest story is going to be the combination of what happens given the two leagues (Central Murray and Golden Rivers) at the end of the year. That could be the really big story, but just in the Central Murray, I think it's going to be a lack of playing depth across the league.

Glenn Stewart - The Northern Rivers enquiry, that's going to shape football in the region, whether it's amalgamations between clubs or the two leagues, it's been nearly 30 years since the last major shake up and I think this one will be just

Central Murray Football

Dee team to beat?

FOR the first time in 23 years, the Demons will enter a campaign as the reigning premiers, with the Nyah-Nyah West community hoping lightning strikes twice at their club.

The Demons only two senior flags prior to last years 54-point win over Kerang came in 2000 and 2001, with the club securing backto-back flags as a result of a talented, but well-coached list and an influx of players from up north.

While NNW United will be aiming emulate the feats of their forefathers two decades ago, they are also aware that it will be no mean feat in a season that shapes as being as close and unpredictable as any in memory.

Most Central Murray clubs have undergone mass changes, with either multiple players arriving or a mass exodus leaving - or in some cases both - leaving season 2025 as one of uncertainty before a ball has even been bounced.

Although the Demons are expected to be thereabouts at the business end of the season, two other clubs are aiming to create a bit of history of their own, with the Mallee Eagles and Cohuna Kangas hoping to follow in NNW United's footsteps and break their own long standing premiership droughts.

For the Eagles, their last seniors flag came all the way back in 1996 - the final year of the old Mid Murray Football League, with the club approaching 30 years since it's last premiership.

After enduring a heart breaking preliminary final loss to the eventual premiers last season, the Eagles have added depth in a couple of areas of deficiency and shape as being a genuine threat to the Demons' crown.

As too do the Kangas, who after storming from the clouds mid-season to make the finals, were unceremoniously bundled out at the first hurdle against Balranald in last year's elimination final.

Much like the Eagles, Cohuna have pushed all their chips in on season 2025, with the club leaving no stone unturned in its quest to secure its maiden seniors premiership since joining the CMFNL in 1997.

As much as the Demons, Eagles and Kangas appear to be the front runners, thev can expect some stiff competition from both Woorinen and Tooleybuc-Manangatang, with both clubs having also retained the bulk of their playing list and studiously added to them over the off-season.

The return of premiership forward Jose Miliado will have Woorinen fans expecting a return to finals football under new coach Tim Free, while the Saints' additions of Josh Grant, Josh Domaille and Josh Koster should also have their supporters dreaming of seeing September action for the first time in six

Also expected to be thereabouts is Balranald, who despite losing several key players, including the Neagle and Lloyd brothers, have also recruited well, with former AFL players Roarke Smith and Mitch Hannan, along with VFL player Cody Henness helping to keep the Roos finals hopes alive.

Perhaps the biggest story could be the improvement of Koondrook-Barham, who under the guidance of new coach Marcus Demaria, appear to be building a very

competitive outfit.

The one surprise however could be Kerang, with the Central Murray powerhouse now appearing to be a shadow of its former self, with as many as 13 players from last year's grand final not returning in 2025.

Also set for a difficult seasons are Lake Boga, Swan Hill and Tyntynder, with the two Swan Hill-based teams suffering mass exoduses and the Magpies continuing to invest in the future by pumping games into their talented kids.

KEY PLAYER

Roarke Smith - After playing 47 games in eight injury-cruelled seasons at the Western Bulldogs, Smith will be the headline act at Balranald this season. An amazing ball user who rarely wastes it, Smith will spend most of the afternoon plying his trade running through the midfield with the Roos.

Can't be expected to do it all and will need considerable help from his new teammates, but should provide a touch of class and forward craft in a similar vein to the departing Jydon Neagle.

BIG IMPROVER

Cruz Jolliffe - Talented youngster who improved markedly during his 18 senior games last season as a back up ruckman to Jordan Wilkins. With Wilkins departing at the end of last season, it's hoped Jolliffe can take over the mantle of number one ruckman and help give the Roos' new-look midfield first use around the stoppages. May be a bit undersized compared to your traditional rucks, but is mobile and can cover the ground well, which makes him a dangerous prospect as he continues his development.



WHAT TO EXPECT IN 2025

It's almost impossible to predict where Balranald will sit come season's end, with such a vastly different team set to take the park against Woorinen in round 1. With over half of their semi-final team departing following last year's failed finals campaign, the Roos' depth will most likely be tested should injuries come as in previous seasons. With Jack Salau and Ben Fuller taking charge, Balranald are expected to play with a much faster tempo than they did under Jydon Neagle, with outside run and spread from the stoppage, similar to NNW United's successful model likely to be used. This will alleviate

some pressure from the Roos' less experienced players to hit targets and use the ball efficiently as they were previously required to do, but also plays to the strengths of their squad given their inclusions.

The return of Toby Lay along with the recruitment of Jye Hogan will help strengthen Balranald's key defensive stocks, while Fuller's return will also add much needed height to their forward 50.

With the additions of Tom Toma and Ricky Monti joining the likes of Joel Helman, Jack Geary and Jackson Williams, the Kangas are going to be very hard to match in the midfield, especially with the underrated Chris Anderson in the ruck.

It took half a season for Cohuna to bed down their new game plan and system under then new coach Geary, but with everything clicking into place with eight straight wins, there should be no slow start this year.

A tough team defensively, having conceded the second least amount of points last season (behind Kerang), the Kangas will be hoping to not only continue to be difficult to score against but also score freely with a more aggressive and attacking system of ball movement.

KEY PLAYER

Joel Helman - It's hard to go past the reigning Jack Betts Medallist and club best and fairest, who can tear any game apart with a 10 minute burst of brilliance. Kicked 31 goals last season and led the Kangas goal kicking as well as dominating out of the centre square, with the dynamic onballer expected to spend more time roaming Cohuna's forward 50 with the arrival of Tom Toma and Ricky Monti. Is desperate to lead Cohuna to their maiden Central Murray premiership and will leave no stone unturned until they achieve that feat.

THE BURNING QUESTION

Where will the Kangas goals come from?

One of the big question marks over Cohuna last season was their lack of a key target up forward in the second half of the year, with the Kangas instead going relatively small and without a recognised target deep. When they did need someone, they turned to Xavier Mitchell, who has since departed the club for Northern FNL club Ivanhoe. Although the Kangas have brought in young key forward Corbin Anderson, he will potentially need some support in the air, despite the presence of Jacob Mitchell, Daniel Coates and a bevy of resting midfielders like Joel Helman and Tom Toma, who are both dangerous around

Sam Leitch could potentially be one that gets swung forward, as can Brenton Conforti, but the make up of Cohuna's forward line will be an interesting watch over the first few rounds.



FROM THE COACH

"We want to play finals and go as far as we can go, that's our goal. We have a little bit better depth than last year, but we're relying on having a healthy list and keeping our good players on the park. We don't want to set a ceiling on our season but we're also not saying finals is a pass mark, just like not playing in a grand final is a fail, we'll just take it one week at a time and focus on producing our best footy more consistently and hopefully we'll be thereabouts at the end of the season."

BIG IMPROVER

Sam McGlone - While no longer a developing youngster, McGlone has by all reports been tearing up the track over the pre-season and is set to take his game to another level in 2025.

Is expected to move to a more permanent role in the Kangas back six, where he can better utilise his powerful kicking, run and carry and good decision making to greater affect. Can be quite damaging with the ball in his hands and his ability to generate attacking play from half back is expected to be a feature of Cohuna's game this season.

It's hard to know exactly what Kerang will bring to the table this season, especially with such a vastly different team to last year.

A new coach, new game plan and new playing list will certainly have everyone guessing in the early rounds, but the one certainty is that they won't be the infallible Blues of previous seasons. 

KEY PLAYER

Kye Attwell - It's hard to believe Attwell is heading into his eighth season of senior football at Koondrook-Barham, with the key forward finally finding some consistency with his body last year after missing the majority 2023 with injury. Has played 72 senior games for the Raiders and has developed into a dominant forward target and dangerous ruckman around the stoppages. BIG IMPROVER

KEY PLAYER

Zac Warne - Returned to his home club last season and had a significant impact, winning the Magpies best and fairest after playing a combination of half-back and midfield

Should spend more time in the middle this year with the departures of several key onballers and is ready for the challenge after a big pre-season. Is a smooth mover who not only covers the ground well, but always puts the ball to the advantage of his teammates.

THE BURNING OUESTION

Are the Magpies' kids ready to fly - or are they another 12 months away? Expectation can be burdensome sometimes, as can impatience, but after many attempts at climbing up the ladder over the past two decades, Lake Boga are going to take their time and do it right this time around.







A change at the top?

THE winds of change appear to have been sweeping through the Central Murray league over the off-season, with new contenders emerging from the pack and perennial finalists struggling to keep up.

After playing off in the last two Central Murray A grade grand finals, both Lake Boga and Swan Hill go into season 2025 with vastly different line-up's - or in the case of the reigning premiers, a completely different line-up.

Having finally ended a 59-year premiership drought and going through last season undefeated, the Magpies will be a shadow of their former self, with all seven of their starting team from last years grand final departing the club.

A similar fate has also befallen their opponent from that afternoon, with Swan Hill losing several key players, including both Zoe Morris and Casey Frame from their attacking third and Tess Meney from their defence.

Making matters worse, reigning Julie

Wardle Medal winner and dominant defender Stevie Bibby will be limited in her availability, leaving the two Central Murray powerhouses to turn to their youth and develop from within.

But the question is - if not Lake Boga or Swan Hill, then who is the team to beat?

Is 2025 the year the preliminary final bridesmaids - the Mallee Eagles - finally break their hoodoo?

Having been beaten in the penultimate game of the season three years in a row, the Eagles may never get a better chance to break through, especially with new recruits Jemma Meehan and Lily Brennan arriving at the club fresh off their premiership at the Magnies

Add in one of the best young players of the competition in Nevaeh Roberts, a dominant midcourt led by co-coaches Alicia Harvey and Jess Jobling and a potent attacking third comprising Megan Thorneycroft, Julia Amezdroz, Kasey Torr and Mikayla O'Meara, and the Eagles look ready to fly.

But if not the girls from Lalbert, then perhaps 2025 is the year the Tigers roar

again, with the return of Tayla Bennett.

Having missed last season, Bennett will once again pull on the yellow and black, with the goal shooter set to form an unstoppable partnership with young gun Willow Conlan in the Tigers' ring.

Or maybe it could be another drought breaking team - such as Cohuna, Kerang or Nyah-Nyah West United, all of which have spent years in the finals wilderness.

All three made significant progress last season, yet all three ultimately fell short of the top five, with the Kangas the unluckiest of all after sitting within the top five all season, until their final round loss to the Demons tipped them out.

The hunger is evident with all three, who can sense an opportunity to not only play finals, but go deep into September with this changing of the guard.

Or could it be the Roos from Greenham Park, who led by the return of their champion goaler Jess Parry, climb back to the top of the ladder

Having returned to the finals last season,

can the Bulldogs continue to climb the ladder under the guidance of new coaches Bridget Dedini and Monica Ellis - or will their bark be silenced by the unlikeliest of stories.

Having won just one game in three seasons, could Koondrook-Barham become a force to be reckoned with after the recruitment of new coaches Emma Peacock and Elly Bookham

After years of pain and heartbreak, the clouds appear to be parting for the Raiders, with blue skies ahead for last years wooden spooners.

There's a similar story building at the Saints too, with their young stars appearing to be on the cusp of turning around their clubs fortunes, with Jayda Plant, Olivia Fowler and Summer Blachford

Although there may be so much uncertainty ahead of the new season, there is one certainty - that no matter who ends up on top of the mountain at the end of the ride, the journey there will well and truly be worth it.

THE departures of several key players has left Balranald's A grade side with numerous holes to fill this season, even with the return of champion goaler Jess Parry from injury.

Parry's return from a knee injury that cruelled her 2024 campaign will be a welcome sight for Roos fans, with the former Julie Wardle medallist considered one of the best players in the competition when at her best.

But Parry will be returning to a vastly different team to the one she last played in, with her partner in crime Ella Mirtschin heading north and the Roo's key defenders Grace Morton, Bree Hodgson and Elli-Jane Pollard also not taking to the court in 2025.

Pollard will remain as coach of Balranald in a non-playing capacity and despite the loss of quality personnel, is looking forward to seeing some of the club's talented youngsters get their opportunity.

"It's been a bit of a rough start to the season, but I still think we're going to be competitive, we have enough talent in our squad that we'll always be competitive." Pollard said.

"Macy Lloyd will get more opportunities and has been ready to step up for a while now, as is Isabella Papa, who will probably play A grade as well as under 17s.

"She (Papa) will probably played a more defensive role in the A grade team, but she's a bit of an all rounder and I know she will adjust really well.

"All the girls will have to readjust to play positions that they're not used to, but I reckon they're all capable."

"Getting Jess (Parry) back is massive for us, she's a huge in and just to have her leadership back out on the court will be a positive in itself.

"Her leadership is just second to none and to be honest, she is probably the best player in the competition when she's up and going, so we're pretty lucky to get her back into our line-up."

The Roos will also gain the services of Katelyn Hazlett, who is expected to help fill one of the vacant defensive posts, while Indi Kirby will also return to the Roos after a couple of seasons away.

Just who else fills the remaining spots in Balranald's defensive third remains to be seen, with the team having good depth in the remaining positions on the court.

It would be expected that either one of Parry, Lloyd or Bec Harvey will move down back in order to keep the Roos' strong midcourt

WITH an influx of talent and another year under the guidance of coach Georgia Anderson, the Cohuna Kangas are perfectly placed to end their finals drought once and for all in 2025.

After starting last year as one of the in-form clubs, the Kangas' form deserted them in the last month of the season, with losses to the Mallee Eagles, Tooleybuc-Manangatang, Swan Hill and NNW United seeing them eventually fall from the five in the final home and away round.

Despite missing the finals, Cohuna should go into the new season full of confidence with the knowledge gained from getting so close and the experience of playing competitive netball against some of the Central Murray's better teams.

That confidence is evident after speaking with Anderson, with the Kangas' second year coach ensuring her team has a clear path to success after a strong pre-season.

"In the first half of last season we were running off adrenaline. It was exciting and we were playing really good netball," Anderson said.

"But you need stamina for a full season, not just stamina per game and last year showed that when you get halfway through a season, that's when you have to take it up another gear.

"How do we change ourselves and kick it up another gear to get better with our intensity?

"It can be hard through winter, but last year, halfway through, that was where we felt we weren't really improving in our game.

"But we've experienced it now and we know what to do and I know our group will be much better for that experience.

"We've had a strong pre-season, there was an expectation for everyone to focus on themselves and come back fit, which they did, and we're looking so much better with our skills than this time last year."

Although Cohuna have lost both Ebony and Maddy Black, along with Delainey Holmes, it's fair to say the additions to their playing list has given them cause for optimism.

Danielle Bird (nee Sawyer) returns and will add to the Kangas' defensive third, while former Kerang shooter Carla Walker will be the perfect replacement for Holmes.

But perhaps the biggest inclusion for Cohuna will be that of former Echuca United coach and premiership player Tanner Edwards, according to Anderson.

"She (Edwards) is a really strong midcourter, she's strong through the centre and will be a huge

addition for us." Anderson said.

"She's also got coaching experience, as does Carly (Geary), Dani (Sawyer) and Carla (Walker), so we're going to be a team full of on-court expertise.

"I love player-led teams. I find them very successful when the players are doing it for themselves and not relying on the coach all the time.

"We're looking very fast-paced and we're really experienced across the court. We have girls who have been in the game for a long time, but they're still coupled with our young girls too, like Marli Easton and Taylor Hird, who just brings so much excitement.

"We have a really good mix on the court of experienced players, and really skillful players, and our young ones that are just eating that up.

"I look at our playing group and I feel excited."

WHILE a lacklustre start ruined Kerang's finals dream last season, the 2025 version is expected to be one of the Central Murray's big improvers.

Having lost eight of their first 10 matches with a brand new squad, the Blues found form late last season, winning four of their last six games and making a late charge for the finals, before losing their last two games.

Those losses showed just how good Kerang could be, with a three-goal defeat to eventual preliminary finalists the Mallee Eagles before ending the season with a fourgoal loss to grand finalists Swan Hill.

Kerang will be without three key players from that team, with Carla Walker departing for rival Cohuna and both Danielle Coates and Keiarah Brooks not returning.

Although the trio will leave big holes to fill on every line, that is exactly what the Blues have managed to do, with 2023 club best and fairest Katelyn Wright returning this season, along with new recruits Madi Hall and Maddy Black.

Hall, a tough midcourter who is strong with ball in hand will be the perfect replacement for Coates, while Wright and Black can each play at either end of the court in a team that will be extremely versatile, according to joint coach Chloe Adams.

"We'll be a lot more settled as a team than we were at this time last year," Adams said.

"Last year we had an influx of players and we were trying to work out what were our best combinations and where everyone best fit.

"We still have a few new players this year, but we also have a real core group there, so it's more about building on that core group with the likes of Katelyn (Wright), who has already played with a lot of the girls before, so she's not a brand new person coming in."

Along with a handful of new players, the Blues will also employ a new coaching structure, with Adams joined by teammates Denise Roberts and Jarni Gilmour in leading the side in a joint capacity.

Although Gilmour has several years of coaching experience, this will be Roberts' first foray into the coaching seat, with the goal shooter having begun her career in navy blue mid-season following an Achilles injury last year.

The addition of Roberts to Kerang's line-up also coincided with the Blues' rise in form, with

the dangerous shooter helping to add some much needed attacking flair to the side.

"I feel like we'll be quite defensive right across the board. We're maybe a little light on for attackers, but we'll be quite strong defensively," Adams said.

"We'll have a bit of height too right down the court, which is a really good thing, but I think it will all come down to the way we gel.

"We showed what we could do last year, especially with Denise (Roberts) down the other end executing the way she does and if we continue to play that brand of netball should do ok, I feel.

"Last year was obviously really disappointing, but at the same time, I think it was a great way to end the season as it gave those girls that haven't had much success a bit of a taste of what being up there and competing against the top sides can feel like.

"There's no way we can wait until half way through the season to get our act together, we'll be coming out hard right from round 1 because we know how much those games mean come the end of the season.

"Every single game matters and I think that will be the case this season more than any other season with a perceived evenness across the league."

While Adams and Roberts are expected to be key contributors at both ends of the court for the Blues, so too will young locals Bree Cordina and Mikala McNeill, with the pair having big pre-seasons as they make the step up into a more permanent A grade role.

FROM THE COACH

"As always, we'll be aiming to play finals. That's been my expectation for the past two years and it hasn't changed. If we break the season down into smaller goals, we'll be making sure that we're putting out a really competitive team and build each week so that we can hopefully peak at the right time of the season. We're aiming to continue building our culture and our development within the squad, and hopefully have some success as well."

IT will be an unrecognisable Lake Boga outfit that takes to the court against Kerang in round 1, with the Magpies undergoing a complete transformation since their 12-goal grand final win over Swan Hill last season.

After ending a 59-year premiership drought last September, the Magpies have experienced a mass exodus, with all seven of their premiership team, as well as premiership coach Anne-Marie Stewart departing the club over the off-season.

Stepping in to replace Stewart is Lisa Ryan, who will return to coaching the top side after stints coaching at NNW United, Birchip-Watchem, Lake Boga and Sea Lake Nandaly, where she won a premiership.

It will be Ryan's first time as a senior nonplaying coach however, with the veteran leader looking forward to the challenge of re-building a squad that is still capable of playing finals.

"I've never not played and coached, so this year will be a new experience for me, even when I came back to (Lake) Boga after Sea Lake and coached the A reserves I was still a player," Ryan said.

"I've coached the juniors in recent years, but this is the first time besides coaching the young girls that I've coached an A grade team as a as a non-playing coach.

"I've changed a lot over the years, I've definitely mellowed a lot with training, but your relationships with the players, that's the important part.

"We're in a transition period as a team, every person that played last year isn't playing this year and we'll have a young team, but it will also be a good chance for me to actually instill some coaching and development into our squad rather than just having great players do the work."

While Ryan will have an entirely new squad to work with, there will still be some familiar faces, with Maddy Gleeson returning to the Magpies after playing with Moulamein last season and young guns Montana Davies and Milla Holt stepping up to play more consistent A grade minutes.

Also returning to the A grade side is experienced defender Felicity Robertson, who will be a valuable component of Lake Boga's new look defensive third, with Steph Anderson being another player expected to get her chance to impress in the A grade side and will fill the wing attack role.

The Magpies will also have some new faces don the black and white this season, with former Tyntynder player Jess Weaver expected to play in attack or defence and Maddie Hickey to run through the midcourt when available in the second half of the season.

"Even though it's going to be a developmental year and we are going to have some young people playing, those young players are more than capable of performing to this level and our new recruits that are coming into the club are going to be good as well."

AFTER taking some big steps forward in the final rounds last season, Tooleybuc-Manangatang could well prove to be the Central Murray's big improvers in 2025, with a young squad hungry for success set to continue their progression.

"I just want them to play as a good, strong, united team that supports each other and has that desire to want to push each other to improve.

"I think that's where our improvement is going to come from, our ability to gel as a team and hopefully we can play some really good netball."

With a predominately young squad at her disposal, Wait is also pleased to see the return of Laura Zanker to her line-up, along with experienced duo Laura Grant and Zoe Livingston, who proved to be valuable midseason recruits last year.

Although Livingston won't be available every week, Grant and Zanker will be, with their experience and knowledge set to be an invaluable asset for Wait.

"Having Zoe and the two Lauras will really add some depth to our squad, as well as maturity that you only get from playing years of netball," Wait said.

"Having that level head that can and that experience is important with a young team as it just makes them stand a little bit taller.

"The confidence and the leadership they bring to the group as well, especially Laura (Grant), she leads by example, even at training, she just works hard and sets a good example for the younger girls."

Grant will most likely partner Olivia Fowler in defence, while Livingston will run through the midcourt alongside another pair of young guns in Jayda Plant and Ella Foley, with Summer Blachford and Rhiann O'Meara set to play in the Saints' attacking third.

Although Wait is expecting big things from her experienced trio, it's the younger members of her squad where the Saints will see improvement, with Plant and Fowler having finished first and second in their club best and fairest last year and further showing positive signs over the past six months.

"In terms of this season, they (Plant and Fowler) are the ones that need to start coming into their own, they've both had some good senior experience and I'm really excited to see what they can do now that they are a bit older and a bit more confident." Wait said.

"It's easy to forget how young they are, Jayda (Plant) is only 16 for example, but they are just so sensible and mature for their age, the physicality doesn't bother them and it's great to watch them go about their work.

"Jayda has been doing Murray region with me and she's been doing some work at the gym, she's a lot stronger and faster than this time last year and 'Liv' (Fowler) has improved in those areas too.

"Summer (Blachford) is only young, so is Ella Foley and Rhiann (O'Meara), realistically they are all young and getting them to work together and work on playing well as a unit will be really important."

FROM THE COACH

"I think if we can get our combinations right, we'll be really competitive. I think there's been lots of change across the league so it will be interesting to see how the season falls, but I'd like to think we'll be much more competitive than we have been. We haven't really got any big guns coming, but I think natural improvement and another year playing together should see us much better placed than last season."

draft, he was picked up the following day by Fremantle at pick seven in the Rookie Draft at 18 years of age.

As a key forward, he stands at 193cm and was the Dockers leading goal kicker last vear.

A knee injury sidelined Treacy for the final three games of the season, but a strong rehabilitation program has aided his return to the field in 2025 and he looks to lead Fremantle's forward line alongside Jye Amiss.

Fremantle lined up against Geelong in their first round of the 2025 season and despite a loss, Treacy snapped an impressive goal on the run, had nine disposals, took three marks and got five kicks.

Pioneers ready to

THE Bendigo Pioneers are moving into their 2025 Coates Talent League season with confidence according to boys' program head coach Danny O'Bree, with the club optimistic about its chance of success this season.

Having shifted their training template over the pre-season to focus on more individualised areas for players based on roles, the team is already seeing positive changes ahead of their first match against the Tasmanian Devils.

The round 1 match, which was yet to be played at the time of print, couldn't have come quick enough for O'Bree and his players after a "long pre-season.

"Whether it's just because it's been a pretty warm summer that we've had, but I think we're all looking forward to getting into actually playing some games," O'Bree said.

"We haven't missed too many sessions with rain delays or breaks, so when you have a pre-season like this, you can't get to the games quick enough.

"We've been a bit more optimistic about where our talent sits after Christmas, even though there's not a huge amount of players on our list that have played consistently in the Talent League, for various reasons.

"Whether it was injury or just unavailability last year, a few of the kids just had snippets of games but had no real consistency, so we don't really know how many of them are going to compete at the level.

"But the last month or so we've really started to see some good signs and we're more confident that they're going to be pretty good at the level."

Although the Pioneers are busily preparing for their opening games of this year Coates Talent League season, a number of the local Central Murray and Golden Rivers kids will have Sunday, May 18 circled in their diaries, with the club set to host the Greater Western Victoria Rebels at the Swan Hill Recreation

It will be the first time since 2022 that the club have played a game in Swan Hill for points, with the Pioneers home games away from Bendigo always a highlight according to

"It's great that we can get an opposition like the GWV Rebels to agree to come up and play in our region and not just in Bendigo," O'Bree said.

"Obviously we'd like to play a few more



games in the region, but it (the program) is sort of designed around AFL recruiters and they tend not to do a lot of traveling outside of the metropolitan area.

There are plenty of positives, it's just great that country teams play in the country and hopefully families and supporters can come and watch homegrown talent and see them play in a national competition.

We asked a lot of our playing group a couple of pre-seasons ago about what they wanted and the feedback was that they wanted to travel and meet in our region and I auess, keep connecting more.

"It's something that can be really difficult for us to do with such a widespread region, but for kids wanting to drive that idea, I think it's important for us to try and make a lot of that stuff happen.



"There's obviously a lot of other things that have to happen, there's costs associated and travel for everyone, but the more opportunities we can provide, the better.'

Despite it being three years between visits, the Pioneers have developed a strong connection to the Swan Hill region, with the club hosting two whole club training sessions Garden Reserve throughout their latest preseason campaign.

Their last match in Swan Hill ended in a 38-point loss to the Calder Cannons in a standalone game, with this year's fixture being the first time that both the boys' and girls' programs have played a double-header at the

"The last time we came up to Swan Hill it was just the boys' team, so it's a great outcome to have both the boys and girls teams playing this time," O'Bree said.

To see the girls playing will hopefully give the local female players something to aspire to as well, to see some of the girls that they've either played with or against or looked up to playing in a national competition will only further enhance that pathway."



THE umpires who keep the beating heart of country football alive are a tightknit group supporting each other and eager to welcome new people into their fold.

Central Rivers' umpires manager Brent Howden is entering his 21st season as a central umpire and is as passionate about it

"My father was an umpire and that got me into it, and after spending a few years as a boundary umpire, I moved into central," he

"I met a lot of new people and it felt right, and it became a social outlet as well.

"I get to make a difference in the sport by recruiting more umpires and we're doing our best to keep it going.

Howden and his umpires train so that their standard is the same across the league. "We train and fine tune so that we can try

and all be on the same page," he said. While there is a stigma to being an umpire that Howden knows is scaring new people away, he said they don't get a lot of

abuse "The players get around you and you're not alone out on the field," he said.

"We've got our groups of umpires all trying to help each other out and doing our best to keep it going.

"There are the other umpires running out there and we have listening devices for newer umpires to get them through the game and give advice if they need.

"If people want to come and have a go then definitely come down.

"We start new umpires out with the



colts before they hit the reserves, with good pathways to run through the grades, and if you're good enough you'll make it.

"I've had the pleasure of seeing umpires come through here and make it in the VFL and AFLW.

"The door is open to new umpires all the time, whether it's round one or 10 of the season.

Central umpire Chloe Wilson is eager to do her first season in the role after jumping in from the boundary at the end of last season.

"I was very nervous for my first game; it was a colts game and it was the most nervous I've ever been," she said.

'Once I threw the ball up for the first time, all my nerves were gone.

"By my first senior game I didn't feel intimidated and the players really got around me, they made me feel ok and accepted my decisions.

Being among the players is less of a barrier and more of a draw card for Wilson as an umpire.

"I like being out there in with the players, it's fun being in control of the game and I get along with them," she said.

Wilson encourages anyone who is interested to get involved after her experience with the league.

"I knew that I wanted to be an umpire when I got started and was encouraged by my mentors, and I just loved it and have since.

'The other umpires always support me and encourage me when I need it.

"If Brent and the others didn't get around me I wouldn't have gotten on the field but they've always been there for me."

Howden needs at least 24 central umpires each round to cover the eight games across

"We haven't got a lot of returning central umpires and at the moment we have more boundary umpires, so we're keen to get some more in central," he said.

"If we have an excess of umpires on any one round, we'll put them all on.

There are currently about 30 people registered as umpires, compared to 55 registered umpires this time last year.

"That's well short of where we need to be unfortunately," Howden said.

The only prerequisite to be eligible to make my top 50 is that they need to be confirmed to be playing in the Central Murray this season at the time of going to print.

That means some new recruits may not be included within this list.

Also, bare in mind, that with several new recruits coming into the league, it's not the easiest exercise to judge players that most of us me included - haven't seen play before.

This list is neither right nor wrong, it is just my opinion - but remember, if you think someone is unlucky to have not made the cut, you need to first decide who to leave out.

FLEMO'S TOP 50

1. Joel Helman (Cohuna)

Reigning Jack Betts Medallist and one of the Central Murray's best players for the better part of the last decade. Is as dangerous forward as he is in the midfield and will have a major say on how far the Kangas progress this season.

2 . Joel Walsh (NNW United)

One of the best intercept defenders in the competition and was a major player in the Demons rise to premiership glory last season. NNW United best and fairest in a premiership year and will be a player all teams need to put time into when they come up against the Demons this season.

Connor Mcdonald (Tooleybuc-Manangatang)

Was joint winner of the Jack Betts Medal along with Joel Helman and Harry Allen after an impressive start to his 2024 season. Claimed the title of the Central Murray's premier ruckman last year, having been named starting ruck in the league's team of the year.

4. Ricky Monti (Cohuna)

Comes to the Kangas with big wraps, having played in Golden Square's 2023 premiership, as well as a dual club best and fairest runner up and interleague best on ground medallist all before the age of 21. Will be a key member of the Kangas potent midfield.

5. Harry Allen (Mallee Eagles)

The third of last years joint Jack Betts Medallist's, but no less influential than Helman or Mcdonald. Hard nosed midfielder who prides

7. Jye Barry (Woorinen)

Finished equal sixth in last years Jack Betts Medal as one of the Central Murray's most consistent and damaging midfielders. His speed and ball use are a feature of his game and is always one of the players to stop when playing the Tigers.

8. Harry Maher (Tooleybuc-Manangatang)

Dominated off half back for the Saints last season and earned himself a spot in the Central Murray's team of the year as a result. Will be a key player for Tooleybuc-Manangatang with his drive out of the back half and ball use.

9. Roarke Smith (Balranald)

Played 47 games of AFL for the Western Bulldogs, before having an impact at VFL level in recent seasons. Lands at Balranald this season and is expected to light up Greenham Park with his speed out of the middle.

Is expected to provide plenty of outside run and speed in the Mallee Eagles front half of





"As a group, we would like to achieve the ultimate success and take the flag, but the girls are sponges for learning and they want to continue their learning and loving their football regardless," Downing said.

"It's important to keep the enjoyment as well as the hunger to make it all the way, but that will depend on the teams in Bendigo as

"We have 12 new players in the program to go with the girls still young to enough to stay down, with only about three girls aging into the women's side.

"There's a clear pathway between the youth girls and women's programs, they train together every week, and our top-age girls are exposed to the women's side where they need to be as well."

The players are as dedicated to their football as any other.

"The travel commitment these girls make is next to none and they do it for their love of footy, it's just part of what they do now," Downing said.

"We've had ten girls training in the Bendigo Pioneers training program across the under 16 and under 18 sides, and it's exciting to watch them have access to that higher level and chase their football dreams."

Woorinen's women's team have gone into recess due to a lack of numbers after once again making it to the season finals in 2024, finishing third overall and keeping the fire going to the preliminary final.

As their second year in the Central Victoria Football League's women's competition and their second finals contest, the side showed the results of their consistent efforts.

They finished the regular season with a bang, defeating Eaglehawk by 133 points before facing them again the week after in the first round of finals.

Woorinen were knocked out by Golden Square, going down by 17 points.

Coach Katelyn Hazlett said that while it was disappointing to go out just before the grand final, the team had a lot to be proud of.

"We did pretty well, we made it to finals and that's a fair effort considering it was only our second year," she said.

"I'm happy with our effort and how we turned up on the day, and how we went the whole season.

"We went strong against Castlemaine last

year, who are the benchmark side.

"We were the closest team to them and went down by just 11 points when they've been undefeated in the past three years."

The team hopes to return as more of the Youth Girls side ages out of the program and look to continue their football journeys.

"The decision to go into recess isn't what I or anyone else wanted but at the end of the day we have a lot of respect for the competition we're in and the teams we play against and we didn't think it would be fair to them to have enough players one week and have to forfeit another week," Hazlett said.

"As hard as this was, we would prefer to go into recess, build on what we still have and present a team that we can be proud of in a year or two instead of burn bridges with the league and potentially burn out our players.

"I'm devastated myself and I know a lot of the other girls are too."

There are still opportunities for women to pursue their football experiences this season.

"For those who still want to play, we encourage them to still train on Wednesday nights alongside our youth girls to keep the program going and building for next season," Hazlett said.

"There is also the opportunity to help out the under 15s in their season in the local competition, to encourage them and keep them



going

"Thanks to those who have been involved and will keep being involved and hopefully we can push towards entering a team again soon with the passionate people who are still around."

The community surrounding the Woorinen sides in CVFL and at home makes it possible for the program to continue.

"We travel down to the Bendigo league but we're pretty lucky because the league has come a long way and we now have equal home and away games," Hazlett said.

"We appreciate the Bendigo sides taking their turns to make the trip up to us, we feel supported and included by the league and the other clubs.

"Although we wear the Woorinen colours, we're fortunate to have players from all around the region, so we have a wide-spread community-feel because the people from all around come out to support their friends and family."

Downing welcomes any girls who want to pursue their football goals to their Wednesday night trainings at the Woorinen oval.

"Even if they just want to come for a kick and start or continue developing their skills in the game, they're welcome to come along."
